### Fr. Terry Keehan

We have launched the voyage of Lent. Ash Wednesday reminded us of our commitment to "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." We here at Holy Family traditionally accompany the reception of ashes with a question that demands a response. This year, as usual, the answer to the question was, and is, "Yes." The question was, and is, "Are you willing to be an instrument of hope for the world?"

Hopefully you have already noticed the word HOPE on the triangular spaces on either side of the altar. That word is a guide for us on the 40 day retreat that is Lent. You will also notice the accompanying words DARKNESS, HUMANITY and VIO-LENCE. We are calling all of you to be an instrument of, and to support, *Peaceful Pathways* in the midst of a world that is sometimes violent, dark and very human. We believe that will lead us to HOPE.

One of the accompanying words is VIOLENCE. Another tradition here at Holy Family is to join together in support of a Lenten Social Justice Project. All of these projects have been rooted in Catholic Social Teaching. This year's project continues that discipline, rooted in such tenants as respect for the dignity of life, solidarity, a commitment to family and community participation.

This Lent we are asking you to support life, stand in solidarity with other organizations and people steeped in violence, and make a commitment with others at Holy Family to strengthen your family and community as well as other families and communities. The intent of our Lenten support this year is Violence Prevention Initiatives and the method of doing so is through *Peaceful Pathways*.

We are so fortunate to be the first and only (so far) parish that is joining Cardinal Cupich's Violence Prevention Initiative along with Catholic Charities, the City of Chicago, Mercy Home for Boys and Girls and St. Sabina Parish. Sue Geegan our Director of Human Concerns, Ro Geisler, our Parish Manager, and I have been researching and discussing our participation in this initiative for several months now. We have looked into possibilities of our ability to express our commitment to the tenants of Catholic Social Teaching and support *Peaceful Pathways* to Violence Prevention.

The two specific programs that we are asking you to be attentive to are "Strong Futures" at St. Sabina in the Auburn Gresham neighborhood on Chicago's south side. "Strong Futures" can begin with young men playing in a basketball league, often with team mates who are in rival gangs. It provides young men with support in job training and other life skills.

The second is the "Peace Corner" run by Catholic Charities in the Austin Neighborhood on Chicago's west side. This program provides youth with alternatives to many issues that often lead to violence. You will hear much more about these programs as Lent unfolds.

We welcome Phil Andrew to Holy Family this weekend. Phil has been appointed by Cardinal Cupich to oversee all of the Violence Prevention Initiatives in the Archdiocese. Sue, Ro and I have talked a lot with Phil recently, and he is genuinely excited to share with us some of the building blocks of both violence prevention and pathways to peace.

Phil comes to us after recently retiring from the FBI. He brings a lot of professional experience in the areas of conflict negotiation and response in the midst of stress, emergency and crisis. I could share a long list of Phil's expertise and qualifications but, most importantly, he is enthusiastic about this very important area wide Violence Prevention Initiative. After meeting with and talking with him, I am confident that he will bring strong leadership and vision.

On a very personal level, Phil was shot in a highly unusual encounter with Laurie Dann, who had just minutes before shot several students at a school on the north shore. Phil's family house is in the neighborhood of the school where the shooting occurred and Laurie, the shooter, fled and literally walked into Phil's home. He and his mother negotiated with her, tried to calm her, non-violently disarmed her of several weapons, but she ultimately held one gun that she shot Phil with.

As you might imagine, this incident shaped much of his professional career as an agent of investigation and security. Please give Phil Andrew a warm Holy Family welcome as he shares his commitment to and energy around Violence Prevention Initiatives. He will be speaking at both the 9:00am and 11:00am Masses. Ro Geisler, Sue Geegan, Fr. Rich Jakubik and I will be speaking at the rest of the weekend liturgies. As has been our custom for the past six Lents, please listen to the story and the cause as it is presented during ALL of Lent and support it financially and spiritually as the Spirit moves you.

## Attention All Ushers & Mass Coordinators!

Please plan to attend a training session on our new parish Emergency Operating Plan on **Tuesday, February 20** from 7:00-9:00pm, in the church. This session is very important since you will be the Emergency Coordinators in the case of emergencies during Mass.

### Attention All Ministers of Care and Others Who Take Communion to the Homebound!

Beginning with the masses on the weekend of March 3/4, we will be making a change in the procedure for you to obtain consecrated hosts for those who are unable to attend mass. Instead of coming to the front to receive the hosts from the priest after Communion, please present your pyx to the Eucharistic Minister when you receive Communion. The EM will place the required number of consecrated hosts in your pyx at that time. After Communion you will be asked to stand at your seat in the assembly for a blessing. You will no longer be called forward after Communion to fill your pyx. That will be done by the Eucharistic Minister when you receive Communion personally. Those who take Communion to nursing homes will continue to fill their pyx directly from the tabernacle (either before or after mass) but will stand for the blessing after Communion.

### First Sunday of Lent



1. Like Abraham, in what ways have you been tested by God? How has this made your faith stronger?

### THE PASCHAL SEASON 40 / 3 / 50

ALL THE DAYS, from Ash Wednesday to Pentecost, are our **Paschal** (Passover) **Season**. The **40** days of **Lent** and the **50** days of **Eastertime** surround the **Triduum**, the **Great Three Days** from Holy Thursday evening through Easter Sunday evening. This entire season has a unity founded in the Easter Vigil. This unity is visibly expressed in our **Lenten**  **reflection on HOPE in the face of violence**, and our continued celebration of baptismal death and resurrection in Christ during Eastertime. To put it another way, **TOGETHER** we seek **HOPE** and deeper conversion during Lent so that we might come to new life during Easter and, in turn, go forth at Pentecost with the power of the Spirit to transform the world.



You will notice throughout Lent that words, as they did during Advent, will play a prominent role in both our Lenten environment and liturgy. Most obvious is the "Word Wall" on each side of the sanctuary and photos that "express a thousand words" on the back wall. In addition, each Sunday during Lent, the entrance procession will include a person carrying a sign with a word written on it, gleaned from the Scriptures for that Sunday, which speaks to our Lenten focus on **HOPE IN THE FACE OF VIOLENCE**. This sign will be placed on an easel near the ambo. After the last mass, the sign will be attached to our Lenten Social Justice display in the narthex. The Penitential Rite each week will provide an opportunity for prayerful contemplation of these words that we hope will enrich your Lenten journey and bring you more fully to the celebration of Easter, and on to Pentecost.

### **Baptisms During Lent????**

In the first centuries of the early Church, a person prepared to enter the Church through a very lengthy process known as the Catechumenate. Near the end of this process there was a 40-day retreat during which the catechumens preparing to be initiated into the community through their Baptism, Confirmation, and reception of the Eucharist at the Easter Vigil. This final period of preparation for Baptism became what we now call Lent. For those already baptized it was a time to encourage the candidates for Baptism and to pray with them. Equally important, it was a time to renew their own baptismal promises.

In keeping with this ancient tradition, many parishes today, including Holy Family, do not celebrate the sacrament of Baptism as a normal practice during Lent. For us, Lent will be a 40-day retreat during which we rediscover the rich, ever-powerful reality of our Baptism and spiritually prepare to renew our baptismal promises at Easter. As a strong visible symbol of our Lenten "fast" the Baptism fonts will be emptied and not filled again until the Easter Vigil when we can once again quench our "thirst" in the waters of new life.



### Book Discussion - *Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion* By Gregory Boyle, S.J.



# Our Lenten journey of hope LENT TOGETHER has begun!

#### Lent still holds power in the imaginations of Catholics. It is not

unusual to find Catholics who have left the Church, still consciously keeping the Lenten disciplines of prayer, fasting and alms-giving. **Ash Wednesday** is still a day when Catholic Churches are filled to the rafters – more people come to Church on Ash Wednesday than on Easter!

### So what is it that Lent speaks to in our lives?

Ann Barr Weems, the gifted and prolific "Presbyterian poet laureate" wrote,

- "Lent is a time to take time to let the power of our faith story take hold of us,
- a time to let the events get up and walk around in us,
- a time to intensify our living unto Christ,
- a time to hover over the thoughts of our hearts...
- Lent is a time to allow a fresh new taste of God!

Perhaps it is the Lenten *promise of a new start* that draws us to engage in Lent; to practice prayer, fasting and alms-giving in the hopes of re-igniting our own faith journeys.



Perhaps Lent anchors us in hope at a time when the natural world can seem to be so arbitrary, winter fiercely hanging on even as day-light valiantly warms the earth desperate to break forth in bloom, heralding the potent possibility that lies just below the surface.

Maybe the deepest parts of us realize that over time, our hearts and souls get messy and Lent *invites to roll up our sleeves and sort through the clutter of our lives* – a spiritual spring cleaning if you will.

Whatever it is Lent does speak to our ongoing need for renewal. It is a season that encourages us to sort things out and let things go. Lent is a season that speaks of our need to re-set our internal clocks, tidy up the inner recesses of the heart in order to commit yet again to what is important.

These are wonderful lessons to share with our children and teens. Lent is a time to make sure they know

- we repent not to be loved, but because we are loved;
- we fast not to suffer for past transgressions but to de-clutter and re-foucs, clearing out what distracts us from seeing and feeling God's love;
- we give, not to insure some far-off inheritance, but because we are confident in God's generousity.



**PRAYER, FASTING** & ALMSGIVING these are the ways we grow closer to God and our neighbor, resources to help us live hopeful, joy-filled lives rich in the harvest of justice, mercy.

### **Passion Play Update**

Our teens have been hard at work for six weeks on our annual Passion Play. This year we have another original script authored by Dr. Peg Hanrahan and Lynn



Daugerdas (this year's Director), entitled "Come to the Water".

Each year we try to bring a fresh look at the Passion of Christ, highlighting the many layers of meaning in this central Christian narrative. This year's passion play opens in Peter's house as the fledging Pentecost community gathers to celebrate the Eucharist.

It is our hope in beginning this way we as a faith community will make the connection with our own

celebration of the Eucharist the night before on Holy Thursday. The Passion is then told in flashback by Mary, mother of God and Peter, as the Pentecost community shares the story of Jesus with a young Jewish couple in need of food and shelter on their way to Jerusalem.

What does water have to do with the Passion? Jesus' own baptism in the Jordan ushers in his public ministry. At the time of his death blood and water flow from his side pierced by the centurion's spear, transforming the cross into the Tree of Life. As we gather to hear again this moving story and venerate the Cross on Good Friday, we are prepared to move into the splendor of Easter at the Holy Saturday Vigil, where we are renewed by the living waters of baptism. #### Family #30

Our new family consists of a single 23 year old African American mom and her two son's ages 4 and 2. She became homeless due low income status. She reported that she got into a disagreement with her mother and another family member in the household and she was put out a few months ago. She reported that she had a history of being homeless during her high school years.

Our mom is working at a cleaning service in Streamwood making \$10.50 per hour. Things were going well until her hours were cut, so now she is looking for either a parttime or full-time position that is more secure. She may have some difficulties finding work because she does not have a High School Diploma. One of her major goals while in New Hope is to obtain her GED.

Both sons are doing well and her eldest son is enrolled in Head Start in the area and she is currently working on getting him in afterschool care. She is also working on getting her youngest son in daycare. Her brother and sister are still helping out with daycare/child care while she is at work. She hopes to secure daycare and afterschool care for both sons soon.

Goals:

- · Saving up at least 3 month's rent & saving IRS tax refund
- Obtaining GED
- Applying for low income housing

This family was most grateful to receive the gifts from a Holy Family Assist A Family donor for Christmas. She reported that the boys really enjoyed opening their gifts and sends a sincere and gracious thank you to all the parishioners at Holy Family and the Peace and Justice Cluster!

#### Family #31

This family consists of a single mixed race (white and black) 24 year old female and her two son's ages 7 and 5. Client became homeless due to emotional abuse from her ex and his family with whom they lived. Her oldest child is from another relationship.

Our mom is doing well, yet is having trouble securing social services from the State of Illinois. She was recently promoted to a manager's position; however, she still works as a server occasionally. She will soon take over as a full-time manager. Our mom has enrolled in school and is working on her Business Associates Degree reporting she will be finished next semester.

Goals:

- · Saving up at least 3 month's rent & saving IRS tax refund
- · Attend work and school as scheduled
- Apply for low income housing

This family was very excited at Christmas, especially receiving all the Christmas presents from Holy Family. She reported that no one has ever helped her like this before.

### 2018 Lenten Social Justice Project "Peaceful Pathways"

This Lenten season, walk with us along "Peaceful Pathways", our social justice project. We're joining Cardinal Cupich's Anti-Violence initiative (endorsed by Pope Francis) targeting vulnerable, at risk youth in Chicago's most troubled neighborhoods. Although "Anti-Violence" describes our intent, "Peace-ful Pathways" describes our approach. Our contributions will support two highly successful local programs: Strong Futures on the south side of Chicago (www.saintsabinapeacemakers.org/strong-futures), and The Peace Corner Youth Center (www.thepeacecorner.org) on the west side.

Through providing a safe physical space, academic help, job counseling, physical activities and a strong support network, both programs work by peacefully rescuing, training and shielding high-risk youth. They arm young people with the fortitude, skills and support needed to avoid the pitfalls of drugs, gangs, and violence. Strong Futures and The Peace Corner Youth Center both have impressive histories and proven results. This Lenten season, we want to help them do even more. Our goal is to raise a minimum of \$25,000. The total amount raised will be split evenly between these two programs.


