Hope, Despair and now, Doubt. Humanity, Suffering and Violence. These are prominent words that express some powerful emotions as we continue our Lenten journey. They are words that we process in and display in our sanctuary and on the triangular walls that flank our sanctuary. They carry with them some heavy and negative connotations. We must acknowledge that Doubt, Despair, Suffering and Violence exist in our world, not only in neighborhoods where the two programs that we are focused on supporting this Lent exist, but as was evident with the high school shooting in Florida last week, in communities a lot like ours as well.

As our pre-Mass ritual states, "We are in this together," and the THIS is Hope in the midst of the challenges that the above words give us. Because it is a virtue and a trait, it is sometimes difficult to identify where hope comes from. Why do some people have more of it, and some people seriously lack it? Why do we have more of it at certain times in our lives, and not so much at other times? I invite you to spend some time this week with the thoughts about Hope shared by Pope Francis on the cover of this bulletin.

The word that will be processed in and displayed near our ambo this week is Doubt, and our scripture readings have a lot to say about it. Listen attentively to the first reading this weekend from Genesis in which Abraham seems to have absolutely no doubt in God's plan. He and Sarah had tremendous difficulty conceiving a child (a challenge that many of you also know) and were at the point where having their own child was all but forgotten. Remember how the story goes on and they finally conceive a miracle child, Isaac. Our first reading this weekend then tells us that God asks Abraham to sacrifice this child that they had waited so long for, a cruel request that seems even more cruel in light of their struggles to have him in the first place. This week's passage begins with, "God put Abraham to the test." We also hear that, at the last second, God rescinds the command to Abraham to sacrifice his son, Isaac. This also gives us a hint that God would eventually sacrifice His only son, Jesus. Let us be inspired by Abraham, a real sign of Hope against Doubt.

In our second reading, which we will hear proclaimed by Elijah, a ten year old who benefits from programming at The Peace Corner on Chicago's west side, one of the programs that we are supporting this Lent. He proclaims that St. Paul tells us, "Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus." If we find ourselves with any doubt, may these words be a source of Hope for us.

In our Gospel from Mark this week we hear the story of the Transfiguration. Like any really dramatic story, particularly those in which we hear the very voice of God, we can be even more inspired to believe and have hope. Let's face it, we all hear God's voice more clearly and directly at times. When you have a moment of clarity, conviction or confidence about a direction, activity or commitment, don't you also naturally feel less doubt and more hopeful? Conversely, sometimes we feel and experience doubt. Those are moments when we have to listen to the voice of God, in prayer and through life's events, even more .

In the words of our Pope Francis, the Transfiguration means '*Listen to Jesus and follow him.*' Let us continue to live out our Ash Wednesday commitment to be instruments of hope for our world. Let us continue to listen to the unfolding story of our Lenten Social Justice project. Let us listen and follow peaceful pathways to violence prevention.

I hope that you share my pride in Holy Family stepping up to be the first parish to enter into a partnership with Cardinal Cupich in this important Violence Prevention Initiative. The Cardinal will be here to share even more of the story and the overall initiative when he presides at the 9:00am Mass on Sunday, March 11.

I want to thank Phil Andrew for sharing a bit about his role and his conviction with us as the Cardinal's delegate for the Violence Prevention Initiative during last weekend's 9:00 and 11:00am Masses.

Please join me in thanking this year's Gala chairs Stephanie Andre-Ouellette, Helen Kalantzis and Kathy Marousis and all who worked so hard to make the event such an expression of who we are and the vibrant mission that we at Holy Family Catholic Community continue to carry out. Thanks to all who attended and supported the Gala in many ways. Your generosity enables us to thrive!

Baptisms During Lent????

In the first centuries of the early Church, a person prepared to enter the Church through a very lengthy process known as the Catechumenate. Near the end of this process there was a 40-day retreat during which the catechumens preparing to be initiated into the community through their Baptism, Confirmation, and reception of the Eucharist at the Easter Vigil. This final period of preparation for Baptism became what we now call Lent. For those already baptized it was a time to encourage the candidates for Baptism and to pray with them. Equally important, it was a time to renew their own baptismal promises.

In keeping with this ancient tradition, many parishes today, including Holy Family, do not celebrate the sacrament of Baptism as a normal practice during Lent. For us, Lent will be a 40-day retreat during which we rediscover the rich, ever-powerful reality of our Baptism and spiritually prepare to renew our baptismal promises at Easter. As a strong visible symbol of our Lenten "fast" the Baptism fonts will be emptied and not filled again until the Easter Vigil when we can once again quench our "thirst" in the waters of new life.

Third Sunday of Lent

1. For those of us old enough to remember, Sunday used to be a very quiet day. Over time, how have the money-changers altered our Sabbath? What can we do in 2018 to recapture the quiet reflection of Sundays past?

Attention All Ministers of Care and Others Who Take Communion to the Homebound!

Beginning with the Masses on the weekend of March 3/4, we will be making a change in the procedure for you to obtain consecrated hosts for those who are unable to attend Mass. Instead of coming to the front to receive the hosts from the priest after Communion, please present your pyx to the Eucharistic Minister when you receive Communion. The EM will place the required number of consecrated hosts in your pyx at that time. After Communion you will be asked to stand at your seat in the assembly for a blessing. You will no longer be called forward after Communion to fill your pyx. That will be done by the Eucharistic Minister when you receive Communion personally. Those who take Communion to nursing homes will continue to fill their pyx directly from the tabernacle (either before or after Mass) but will stand for the blessing after Communion.





Book Discussion - *Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion* By Gregory Boyle, S.J.



Pastoral Care

IS THERE SOMEONE YOU KNOW WHO MIGHT BENEFIT FROM A VISIT FROM A MINISTER OF CARE?

The Ministry of Care at Holy Family Parish regularly participates in the important ministry of visiting the sick, the suffering, the elderly, and helping a person and their loved ones prepare for the critical time of death and dying.

MINISTERS OF CARE AT HOLY FAMILY

The role of our Ministers of Care at Holy Family Parish involve bringing communion to the homebound, those in hospitals, or in nursing care facilities. There is no prohibition to the Ministers of Care or other members of Christ's body in offering prayers on behalf of the sick, and even laying hands on them or using oil. *Where two or three gather in the name of the Lord, Christ is present in their midst* (Matthew 18:20). While prayer may not be a sacrament, it is "sacramental" in the sense that the rosary or a scapular is "sacramental." All prayers on behalf of the sick are beneficial. Praying for each other or ritualizing the passing of a loved one in a simple form of anointing by family and friends is known to be healing and truly sacramental.

IS NOW THE RIGHT TIME TO RECEIVE THE SACRAMENT OF HEALING? PLEASE CONSIDER THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK FOR YOU OR A LOVED ONE.

On Nov. 30, 1972, Pope Paul VI issued an apostolic constitution that revised the formula and approved the rites to be observed for anointing and pastoral care of the sick. The first grace of the sacrament is one of restoring strength and health. But if this is not possible, then it brings the grace of peace and courage to meet the difficulties that go with serious illness or frailty.

Baptized members of the Christian faithful who have reached the age of reason and who begin to be in danger due to sickness or old age may receive the sacrament of anointing. Participation in the rites is encouraged broadly. For example:

• The elderly who are weakened, even though no notable illness is present, may choose to participate in the ritual.

- · Those who face surgery due to serious illness
- Those who suffer serious mental illness

THE MANNER AND TIME

The canons simply state that the sacrament may be celebrated at an opportune time with members of the family and others from the faith community, effectively expressing the share that each one has in the suffering of others. The ritual should correspond to the particular situation of the person who is sick. Preferably, the celebration would take place while the person is capable of active participation and at least implicitly gives consent.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

To arrange for a person who is a home, hospitalized, or in a nursing care facility to be visited by a Minister of Care or receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick by one of our priests, please contact Mimi Ferlita at the Pastoral Care Office at 847-907-3425. Monthly Anointing of the Sick takes place on the Frist Friday of the month following the 9am Mass.



The Labyrinth Prayer Walk

The Labyrinth prayer walk is an indoor prayer walk opportunity during the Lenten season. It has a well defined circular path that you walk, which leads you to a center, then leads you out to where you began. It is a spiritual, sacred walk. HOLY FAMILY TEENS SPEAK OUT

Do you ever wonder how teens view the impact that Teen Faith programs have on their lives? This Lent we have asked some of our teens to tell you in their own words.

One of our most popular ministries is the Kairos Retreat. Here is reflection by Emily Kurka who participated in Kairos as both a retreatant and then as a team leader. Emily graduated from Fremd in 2018 and now attends the University of Iowa. She posted this reflection on **ODYSSEY** on January 29, 2018.

How Kairos Changed My Life by Emily Kurka

For any who do not know, Kairos is a Catholic retreat for juniors and seniors in high school. It takes place at an off-site Retreat Center over the course of 3 days and two nights. No phones are allowed on the retreat, and everyone is put purposely into small groups, with people they do not know. Over the course of the retreat you grow closer to God through talking to people who are able to lead you in the right direction.

Anyone who has been on Kairos can confidently say that it changed their life, I went as a junior in high school and can confidently say the same. At the time I signed up, I did not have much knowledge about Kairos but I knew I wanted to try it out. My whole life, I have been raised Catholic but I never really thought of the religion as my own, it was more of what I was told I was by all my family members. *Kairos took religion and made me want to be a Catholic for all the right reasons.*

There are no words to describe the impact the retreat has on all those lucky enough to go on it, but I will try my best. Since it was a church retreat, it was centered around God. However, never in the way any other retreat or church camp has been, at least for me. Kairos is not a retreat where you learn the rules of the religion and are lectured about what is right and how to exactly follow the Bible. The adults and leaders of the small group allow the kids on the retreat to hear a passage and interrupt it for themselves. The message of the passages are usually very clear, but little details and opinions vary from person to person. Through doing this, Kairos allows you to take your religion and make it your own, to embrace every passage and every guideline there is to offer. After Kairos, I started going to church every Sunday because I wanted to. Mass

was no longer an hour I dreaded, but an hour I never wanted to end. After allowing myself to fully engage in something that I had never experienced before, I loved going to church and learning more about the lessons God wants all his followers to know.

In addition to the religious aspects of it, Kairos allowed me to bond with people I would have never met. The three days of being so far removed from daily reality is eye opening. Throughout high school, people tend to only hang out with people in their friend group, and very rarely interact with others outside of class or sports teams. My Kairos small group included six other retreatants I did not know, two teenage leaders and two adult leaders. I am amazed how close and comfortable I got with every person in my group by the end of the

weekend. We were no longer strangers, we knew each other's fears, dreams and secrets. I was able to

to completely be myself with a group of people that had been strangers to me just a few days before. I have always been a pretty private person keeping my problems to myself. Kairos was the first time I felt comfortable enough to open up to people about things I had never talked about, even if they seemed insignificant. It is amazing that in such a short time, I found the comfort to talk about myself in ways I had not with my friends I had known my whole life. It sounds strange, but there really is something special about being removed from daily reality for a couple of days ato focus on yourself and others. There was not a single second I was worried about missing out on anything with my friends back home. Nor did I find myself craving to check social media to catch up on everyone's daily tasks.

Life when I got home, was just happier. I felt happier inside and better about myself. There is an ongoing joke that the kids are on a "Kai High" when they return home because everyone is fulfilled from the amazing past few days. I will not go into detail about the many experiences on Kairos that truly changed, because I do not wish to spoil it for someone who has not been on it yet. Kairos is not a retreat that will change into someone that obsesses over the Bible or only hangs out with people from church, but it does change your outlook at life. It opens doors to new friendships while still upholding old ones, making it the best of both worlds. I am forever grateful I decided to go and throw myself into every activity in order to get the full benefits from the retreat.

I urge everyone that has the chance to go, TAKE IT! You will never regret it, nothing but good comes from it.

Holy Family offers two Kairos retreats each year, one in the fall and one in the spring, involving 90 to 100 teens annually. All high school juniors and seniors and their friends are welcome to attend. The parish subsidizes this retreat on average \$15,000.00 annually over and above what the retreatants contribute so that all teens who want to participate can.

Adults are always needed to be part of the retreat team or assist behind the scenes. If this is something you might be interested contact the Teen Faith Office.

BE KIND SEEK FAIRNESS MAKE PEACE LENT TOGETHER FAMILY & TEEN FAITH'S LENTEN RESOLVES

I know that God works in strange ways, and that his ways are not ours. So I don't mind telling you that the art installation in the Narthex took me aback. Images flooded back, memories returned of the time I spent working in inner city neighborhoods, teaching in inner city schools. I remembered the places I have been that ooze despair, where death and decay are on full display and no one stops to cover up the mess. Places where blood stains the pavement and graffiti proclaims the everyday misery of people's lives. The sights and smells and sounds of darkness and fear returned unbidden.



I saw again the children who play amongst the debris of violence hypodermic

needles, broken glass, used condoms, rotting food, broken furniture, rusty metal... I heard again their squeals of laughter peppered with vile obscenities. I watched in my minds-eye children navigate their way to school amongst the addicts, the homeless, the mentally ill, the gang members. I saw the chain link fencing and yellow police tape surrounding the latest crime scenes and recalled the boarded up buildings officially declared unsafe, unfit for human habitation in which some of my students lived. And my eyes welled up with tears. Arriving on Ash Wednesday my heart clenched as I gazed at the cross framing the faces of those gunned down, lives snuffed out by drugs and gangs and desperation. Pray, fast, give alms, really? In the face of such tragedy this is what you want from me? You want me to engage in washed-up, washed out spiritual practices when the world is falling apart?

Yes, this is what the Lord requires, I heard the scriptures announce. I was to pray fervently as if every life depends on my prayer. Fast from all the ways I might in some small way contribute to the violence, or shelter myself form the pain or try to inoculate myself through privilege. I was to give all I had not waiting to see if another would step up first. For this is not *"their"* story this is *"our"* story. *A modern-day Passion writ large.*

This is what it means to be a disciple of Christ's, one who comforts those who mourn, hungers for justice, weeps with those who weep, heals the sick and casts out demons. And if I thought that violence can be contained, despair limited, as long as I found refuge in a safe place, my heart was broken open by suburban teens in Florida whose lives were shattered, for teachers



whose greatest fear became real in a new Valentines' Day massacre, for parents who now face unspeakable sorrow.

Yes Lord, I will pray, I will fast, I will give all that I have to stand up against evil this Lent. I will teach the little ones in my care to be kind, to seek fairness, to be peacemakers and tell them in doing so they will perform miracles of love and be hope for a broken world.




