We have welcomed many special guests to Holy Family recently who have each expressed profound gratitude for our partnership with them in the Violence Prevention Initiative. Fr. Mike Pfleger very passionately and personally shared many of the challenges that he sees to building Peaceful Pathways in his neighborhood and the larger community of Chicago and surrounding suburbs during his presentation here last Thursday evening. You may or may not know that Mike adopted three boys and one of them, Jarvis, was shot and killed by gun violence. I don't think that you could get any more personal motivation than the pain of losing a child in the addressing of the many complex issues that can lead to violence. Our support of the Strong Futures program at St. Sabina, where Mike is the pastor, flows from the great work that this program does in assisting young men in developing life skills and receiving support that leads to jobs and a more stable life style.

We welcomed Phil Andrew who is the newly appointed Director of the Archdiocese of Chicago's Violence Prevention Initiative. Holy Family was the first parish that Phil visited and he continues to be very appreciative that we are leading the way for parish efforts in violence prevention.

This past weekend we also welcomed Kathy Donahue, Director of Programs, and Mike Waters, Northwest Regional Director, both from Catholic Charities who also are very grateful for our support of the Peace Corner, one of their programs on the west side of Chicago in the Austin neighborhood. The Peace Corner focuses more on support for youth and engages them in many activities including athletics, teaching young people life skills and providing education that challenges many pressures in the community that often lead to gun violence. The Peace Corner provides nutritional meals that we are giving to his Violence Prevention Initiative. He is very impressed with the unique and passionate way that we are able to tell stories and convey the importance of this and other events and endeavors through technology, our screens and the creative use of our space, including the sacred space of our church.

SO... We have been telling the story of the Strong Futures Program and The Peace Corner and, as in past Lents, we have used the first few weeks of this season to share the information and tell the stories, NOW is the time that we ask for your financial support for our Lenten Social Justice Project. Envelopes for your donations can be found on the shelves in the Narthex or near the basket in or the display in the narthex. You may then place your donation in the basket in front of the altar.

As you may recall, I was planning on taking a six month sabbatical beginning last August and lasting until Christmas. With my mom's decline in health and eventual death, I postponed my plans. I have requested and been granted a two month mini-sabbatical beginning April 2 lasting until June 9. My plans include extended time at four retreat houses, two local, one in Wyoming and one in Montana. My schedule will enable me to be back here at Holy Family for important events including Confirmation, First Communions and HFCA Graduation.

I look forward to this time away that will enable me to write and finish some other projects. Fr Rich Jakubik will be available for Masses, funerals and additional administrative needs. In addition, Fr. Bill Zavaski and other priests have generously offered to preside at Masses and other sacramental celebrations in my absence. Even though I welcome some time away, I will miss being with you and, as always, ask for your prayers and know that you will constantly be in mine.

How do I schedule a wedding at Holy Family?

To schedule a wedding, contact Paula Nowicki in the Pastor's office. Paula has the most up to date information about available wedding dates and times. Our weddings are scheduled on Fridays at 5:00 pm and on Saturdays at 12:30 pm or 2:30 pm. Please be sure to book your date through the church before securing a reception venue. Who provides the music for weddings at Holy Family?

Our music office will happily assist you with the selection of professional musicians/vocalists as well as the selection of songs for your wedding. The fees for musicians/vocalists are not included in your wedding fee.

Am I allowed to change the decorations in the church for my wedding?

Our church environment reflects the liturgical season and therefore can't be changed for weddings. You are welcome to add flowers (placed according to the guidelines outlined in our wedding manual) in the church, and bows on the pews. Runners are not allowed because they are a slipping hazard on our tile floor.

• What is included in our wedding package?

§ You will have a one hour wedding with 30 minutes for set-up beforehand (done by our wedding ministers) and 30 minutes for photos in the church after the ceremony/Mass.

§ You may attend a Wedding Orientation and you will receive a wedding manual to answer any questions you may have

§ A sound technician will be in the loft for your wedding to handle all sound needs.

§ Wedding Ministers will review your wedding day liturgy plan with you, conduct the wedding rehearsal, set-up for the wedding and clean up after the wedding, and assist in any way during the wedding.

§ Kristen Berryhill from our Music Office will be available to help you with any wedding music questions and to assist with choosing musicians and songs.

Spirit Camp 2018

We're about to leave the harbor! Additional crew members needed! We are in the process of forming our Spirit Camp (VBS) leadership team and thought you might be a perfect addition to the gang! What's summer without camp? And this year Holy Family's

Spirit Camp (VBS) is going to be amazing!

We're sending out a message to let the adults and teens of Holy Family to let you know how you can help.

Here's what we need

Snacks are essential if you're shipwrecked! We need folks



to lead this area of Spirit Camp. This team is responsible for planning snacks for each day. You seek donations from local businesses as well as purchase snacks. **Starbucks, Peterson's Bakery and AMC, just to mention a few, LOVE helping out.** There is typically one snack for the kids and a different one for adults. Your volunteer crew will consist of both adults and teens who will help serve the snacks and clean up. The biggest part of your job takes place in the pre-camp planning.

Curriculum: These leaders start with a manual and lesson plans for each day. The lessons are built around creating an environment that allows kids to feel like they are "in" a Bible story. Instructions in the manual tell you exactly how to decorate the room and how to get kids involved in the story. There may be some role playing involved in the lesson but if that is not your gift you can recruit someone else to do that part.

Imagination station: We already have one leader committed to this area and she is a veteran returning from last year. A second and/or third leader is needed to help her plan this area. Imagination station is the area where kids might do science experiments or hands on activities related to the theme of the day. You will have a manual with suggestions for each day you can choose to follow or make your own.

Decorations Leader: These folks are responsible for planning and directing the decorating efforts of camp. Holy Family is the envy of most of the VBS programs in the area because of the environment we create for Spirit Camp. We have a start on this area – we already have a boat and custom painted screens of the seashore. We also have a treasure trove of stuff from previous camps we can re-purpose and of course the publisher provides tons of ideas and props we can purchase. If you're creative and a little zany this is your area.




Parish Provides FAMILY & TEEN FAITH big lift to Integrate Technology into Faith Formation

In a recent blog post Danny Moreco, of SecureEdge Networks, writes, "Technology is everywhere--entwined in almost every part of our culture. It affects how we live, work, play, and most importantly learn." The current generation of digital natives are used to technology in classrooms. It is no secret that Religious Education often lacks technological aided instruction. The cost of these tools is often prohibitive and the field of technological aided instruction is

programs and apps become available for Religious Education the integration of these tools we prove even more valuable. Who knows, Holy Family folks may even be part of developing new programs and apps for faith-based learning.

HOLY FAMILY TEENS SPEAK OUT Do you ever wonder how teens view the impact Teen Faith programs have on their lives?

The fourth in our Lenten series is a reflection by *Camilla Mroczkowski*, Fremd class of 2017, now in her first year at DePaul University in Chicago. Camille writes about her experience of being a Eucharistic Minister. Currently 17 high school teens serve as Eucharistic Ministers here at Holy Family. Many others serve as EM's at their college/universities chapels and parishes.

In 1996, in the parish of Santa Maria y Caballito Almagro, in Buenos Aires, Argentina, a host was found to have living muscle tissue from a human heart. It was truly alive. Such 'Eucharistic miracles' though rare, have occurred throughout history and in many places. It is important to remember that only after intensive investigation, does the Church declare such a miracle. In this instance, the renowned scientist Ricardo Castanon Gomez, headed up the investigation.

As Catholics, we believe that the Eucharist presented at every mass undergoes transubstantiation. Simply put, we are able to witness bread and wine be transformed into the actual body and blood of Christ. We even undergo a transformation, ourselves. Every time we accept the body and blood of Jesus, we are both verbally and physically accepting Jesus Christ into our lives.

I cannot even fathom that God finds me worthy enough to be a part of such a process. As a Eucharistic Minister, you have the power to share in the blessed transformation of your parish family. You may call them by name and actually watch them experience God's glory, right before your very eyes. If seeing is believing, then God will allow you to see His will at work, and even engage you in helping Him in carrying out that work.

I was once told by a priest that "We come to receive the Eucharist to simultaneously receive healing." We aren't perfect because we are only human, but what a blessing it is to confidently share in imperfection, healing, and faith with believers just like you.



Through Eucharistic ministry, the Mass is experienced in a life-changing way. You realize that it is far more than simply being nourished at church. *You comprehend that God is present. He is with you. He is with everyone at the mass.* What greater gift could God give us undeserving humans than the gift of presence and the very privilege to give out His own body and blood? But don't take my word for it. Experience it for yourself. Become a Eucharistic Minister.

The story of the Eucharistic Miracle at *Santa Maria y Caballito Almagro in Buenos Aires* is told in detail in *Reason to Believe: A Personal Story* by Ron Tesoriero. The Auxiliary Bishop of Buenos Aires, Jorge Mario Bergoglio, now Pope Francis, was part of the scientific investigation.




