Fr. Terry Keehan

We are entering into the holiest week of the year. This coming week has really captured my spiritual imagination recently. I have been moved, through a lot of prayer, to share my passion and intrigue with Holy Week so much so that I have developed a retreat to present to parishes, friends and fellow priests. I was honored to share the retreat in a one day format with many of you here at Holy Family this Saturday. Every time I lead the retreat I am moved to include more and more emotion and power. Each time I experience it through reflection and prayer, I notice something new about the saga, drama and adventure of this most Holy Week.

Here is a sample of what I am talking about and I hope that it will add to your appreciation of the richness of life led by the events of Jesus and his followers, and hence you and I and the world, from Palm Sunday through Easter.

Jesus asked his disciples to **PREPARE** for his entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. How have you prepared for this holy adventure of Holy Week? How has your Lent been? Have you used the words that we have processed into church and displayed near the ambo to reflect on what leads us (you) to violence? Give them some reflection now in order to prepare for Holy Week. They are:

Despair Doubt Judgment Anger Fear Hope

Jesus then **ENTERED** into Jerusalem. Are you committed to enter into Holy Week? Are you willing to take extra time to reflect on the powerful story of Christ's journey that includes:

- Gathering with those he loves the most knowing he is going to suffer and die?
- Celebrating the Last Supper and giving us all two significant gifts: first, his REAL presence in Bread and Wine and second, a selfless example of SERVICE to others in the washing of feat?
- Are you really present to those you love? Do you serve others as you should in the spirit of Jesus?

As Jesus enters the great city of Jerusalem the people are filled with **EXPECTATION**. They are hailing him as a king and are moved with optimism on both political and spiritual levels, because Jesus has preached a holistic message that has challenged both civil and religious authorities. He is clearly different than any other prophet. What are

your Expectations for this coming Holy Week.?

Asking some of these questions may open your heart to the phenomenal news of Christ's Resurrection.

Please join our teens for another prayerful Passion Play this coming Good Friday at Noon, 3:00pm and 7:30pm. All three will be followed by veneration of the cross and the 3:00pm service will include the veneration of the cross, petitions and communion.

Please consider attending the Easter Vigil beginning at 8:00pm on Saturday evening as we celebrate one of the most beautiful liturgies of the entire year during which we welcome our adult Candidates and Catechumens into full communion with our Church.

Please see the front cover of this bulletin for the entire Holy Week schedule. Come and celebrate the new, full life of Easter with us and be sure to bring a friend or loved one along. Pray into the drama of Holy Week and prepare yourself spiritually.

As you may recall, I was planning on taking a six month sabbatical beginning last August and lasting until Christmas. With my mom's decline in health and eventual death, I postponed my plans. I have requested and been granted a two month minisabbatical beginning April 2 lasting until June 9. My plans include extended time at four retreat houses, two local, one in Wyoming and one in Montana. My schedule will enable me to be back here at Holy Family for important events including Confirmation, First Communions and HFCA Graduation.

I look forward to this time away that will enable me to write and finish some other projects. Fr Rich Jakubik will be available for Masses, funerals and additional administrative needs. In addition, Fr. Bill Zavaski and other priests have generously offered to preside at Masses and other sacramental celebrations in my absence. Even though I welcome some time away, I will miss being with you and, as always, ask for your prayers and know that you will constantly be in mine.

Let us continue to pray for and support our Candidates and Catechumen who are on a journey towards full communion with us here at Holy Family and the Church throughout the world: Anthony Suubi (Elect/Catechumen), Andrea Ruetten, Amanda Cummings, Timothy Esposito, Penelope Ffitch-Heyes and Randall Gurvitz.

PALM SUNDAY:

"BLESSED IS HE WHO COMES IN THE NAME OF THE LORD!"

The primary symbol of Ash Wednesday is the signing of our foreheads with ashes; today, Palm (Passion) Sunday, the primary symbol is our procession with palms.

In biblical times, the palm tree symbolized victory and well-being. It provided shelter and even food in desert borderlands and was highly prized in many cultures. Palms were part of the bouquet offered in homage on festive occasions or to celebrate victory. When Christ triumphantly entered Jerusalem, people strewed palm branches in his path and greeted Him with praise. In New Testament times, the palm was used to decorate grave markers and tombs in

the catacombs as a sign of paradise and the triumphal death of the martyr. Church art and decoration frequently included the palm. The blessed palm that we receive at Mass today is a sacramental, a symbol of Christ's presence among us. In our homes, it is usually placed over a bed, entwined on a crucifix, or displayed near some holy picture or statue. Since the 11th century, in Western countries, it has been a custom to decorate it with ribbons or work it into an artistic pattern, such as a cross. Before Ash Wednesday, blessed palms are burned and the ashes are used to mark our foreheads as a sign of penitence at the beginning of Lent.

Today's procession with palms reminds us of the story of Jesus' solemn entry into Jerusalem. We see Jesus coming in riding a work animal of the humble and poor, not astride the mighty horse of a conqueror. The prophet Jesus from Nazareth is hailed by the crowd as the Son of David, but this Galilean king is very different. Our Lord Jesus Christ does not need the trappings of power to reign.

Today's procession, however, is much more than a reminder of a past event. If we were to see in the procession only a crowd waving palms and singing joyous songs, we would miss its real significance in the liturgy. This procession is not simply a commemoration of Christ's entry into Jerusalem 2,000 years ago, nor is it simply a triumphal march. This procession is Christ's journey, TOGETHER with us, his people, to Calvary and the great central act of redemption.

Today we enter Holy Week, a week of HOPE and holy renewal As we go through the ups and downs of this week, as we come **TOGETHER** here to celebrate as a faith community and as we observe it at home with our families, we are called from the depths of our faith to proclaim to the glory of God the Father: Jesus Christ is Lord! Jesus Christ is love!

THE PASCHAL SEASON 40 / 3/50

ALL THE DAYS, from Ash Wednesday to Pentecost, are our Paschal (Passover) Season. The 40 days of Lent and the 50 days of Eastertime surround the Triduum, the Great Three Days from Holy Thursday evening through Easter Sunday evening. This entire season has a unity founded in the Easter Vigil and visibly expressed in our Lenten reflection on HOPE in the face of violence, and our continued celebration of baptismal death and resurrection in Christ during Eastertime. To put it another way, TOGETHER we seek HOPE and deeper conversion during Lent so that we might come to new life during Easter and, in turn, go forth at Pentecost with the power of the Spirit to transform the world.

Triduum: Come to the Table, Come to the Cross, Come to the Fire and Water!

The Great Three Days, the Easter Triduum, is the center of the year for Christians. Everyone in the community is invited to plan ahead so that the whole time, from Thursday night until Easter Vigil, is as free as possible from distractions. We are asked to fast during Good Friday and to continue fasting, if possible, through Holy Saturday, so that we come hungry and full of excitement to the Easter Vigil. We make Good Friday and Holy Saturday free for prayer, reflection, preparation and silence. The Church is getting ready.

Whether you are young or old, please set these days aside for HOPEful renewal. All of us should know that our presence for the **three-day** liturgy is not just by invitation. We are all needed here on these, our greatest days.

On these three days, we gather several times. Together we hear some of the Church's most beautiful prayers and scriptures, and we make some of our finest music. Please look closely at the following schedule and make plans to take part in these **Great Three Days**. Above all, come on Saturday night for the Vigil.

Day 1

The first day of the Triduum, from Holy Thursday sunset to Good Friday sunset, is like the sixth day of creation when God formed us from clay and breath. In dying, the Lord Jesus fell asleep, like Adam, that we might be formed from his own body, like Eve, a new creation.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper will be celebrated at 7:30 PM on Holy Thursday, March

29. The church bells and the sounding of the shofar will call the community to physically and spiritually prepare ourselves, and enter into the sacred Triduum. After listening to the scriptures, we wash each other's feet in tender humility, imitating Jesus who gave us this image of what we, the Church, the Body of Christ, is supposed to look like, feel like, act like. We then celebrate the Eucharist, a sharing in the Body and Blood of Christ that is best expressed in the way we serve and minister to one another. This evening liturgy has no dismissal, no ending. We are now in the quiet, the peace, and the glory of the Triduum. We follow the Blessed Sacrament in silent procession before it is reposed for us to pray and keep watch with Christ until Midnight.

Day 2

The second day of the Triduum, beginning Good Friday sunset, is the Sabbath. In the daylight hours preceding sunset, and afterwards, we will have several opportunities to gather in the quiet and experience a dramatic presentation of the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ (Noon, 3:00 PM, and 7:30 PM on March 30). We pray for the needs of the world. The holy cross is held up in our midst and we come forward to do reverence with a kiss, a bow, or a genuflection. No Mass is celebrated. In burial the Lord Jesus rested, and we rest with him, through the night and into the next day. This day is an image of the timelessness before time began.

In death the Lord Jesus entered the "formless void," the utter nothingness before creation. On this day we continue our fasting with the anxiety of separated lovers. We keep watch, learning the lessons of restfulness, silence and darkness. We reserve this day, unique in all the year, to do nothing at all except to glory in the cross of Christ.

Day 3

This third day of the Triduum begins Holy Saturday sunset. Hungry and thirsty now, and full of excitement, the Church gathers in the darkness and lights a new fire and a great candle that will make this night bright. We listen to some of our most powerful scriptures: stories of creation, Abraham and Isaac, Moses and Miriam and the crossing of the sea, poems of promise and rejoicing, the gospel of the resurrection. Once again we raise our voices in joyful praise as we sing the Gloria and Alleluia for the first time since Lent began. We pray for all our saints to stand with us as we go to the font, filled once again with the waters of new life. There the elect are baptized and all of us renew our baptismal promises. These are the moments when death and life meet, when we reject evil and recall who we are as Children of God. All of this we do TOGETHER, in the communion we call Church. We go to the table and celebrate the Easter Eucharistic Feast. Easter day begins and we are ready for Fifty Days of rejoicing. "HOPE IS ALIVE! THIS IS THE DAY THE LORD HAS MADE, LET US REJOICE AND BE GLAD, ALLELUIA, ALLELUIA!

Our Easter Vigil Mass begins at 8:00 PM on March 31. This is the greatest feast of the year...don't miss it!

If you cannot attend the Vigil, our celebration of resurrection continues on Easter Sunday, April 1. Masses are at 6:30AM, 8:00AM, 10:00 AM and Noon in the Church, as well as 10:00AM in the Multitorium and Social Center.

CELEBRATING HOLY WEEK AND THE PASCHAL TRIDUUM AT HOME

Holy Week begins today: when the sun sets on Holy Thursday, Lent ends and the Triduum, our Great Three Days, begins. Weather permitting, try to spend some time outdoors as a family this week. Go for walks...observe the evidence of spring and new growth like tulips and daffodils just beginning to bloom. Cut some lilac or forsythia branches, put them in water and watch them leaf out right before your eyes. Look closely at the buds of trees. Choose one tree and go out to observe its new life each day. If you live near a steam of water, listen to it rushing with new life. Look for the "resurrection" of creeping and flying creatures. Listen to the sounds of birds returning from warmer climates. Smell the clean freshness of the air and touch the earth that is warming. Become aware of the new life around you and the new life budding within you because of a Lent well-lived. We, like nature, are undergoing the struggle that is spring. We are returning to the Lord who calls us to "come forth" to new life. Talk about this as a family.

On holidays, some people enjoy putting away ordinary things and using only holiday things. Routines get interrupted. When it comes to Good Friday and Holy Saturday, the tradition of the paschal fast asks us to do something similar. Ordinary things can be put away or turned off. Leave the mail and paper unread for these two days. Turn off the television, radio, computer and iPod for a time. Spend time together as a family preparing for the celebration of Easter.

The best family preparation activity that I can recommend to you, however, is not at home. It is to celebrate the liturgies of the Triduum with your parish family here at Holy Family. They are so rich and full of meaning that the liturgies themselves are sufficient for a family Triduum experience. Someone once said, however, that "liturgy begins at home." So, while I encourage you to go with your family to all the liturgies of the Triduum, I also invite you to begin at home by spending some time each day explaining to your children what is being commemorated on each of these special days. If you need some help with that, please refer to the other bulletin article entitled "The Paschal Season."

The Easter Vigil is the high point of our liturgical year, but it can be a long service for pre-school age children. With preparation, however, it can be a wonderful learning and worship experience for families of school-age children since it is such a dramatic and symbolically rich service. To be able to appreciate it, children should first of all be familiar with the story of creation, the story of the Israelites' gaining freedom from slavery, and the story of our own liberation from sin to salvation through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. They should be helped to understand that the lighting of the great Easter fire is a symbol of Christ, the Light of the World, who triumphed over the darkness of evil. The lit Easter (Paschal) Candle is the lasting symbol in our church of Christ risen. It stands throughout the Easter season

until Pentecost as a reminder to us of the risen Lord's presence; it is lit for all baptisms and funerals throughout the year as a reminder that the Light of Christ can never be extinguished. The baptism of the adult elect at the Vigil will be more meaningful if children have been told the story of their own baptism. And, remember bring home some Easter holy water. If, however, you just don't feel that you and your family will be able to last through these two-plus hours of celebration, please consider coming for just part of it. Whenever you or your children are too tired to stay longer, please feel free to leave and return on Sunday for a complete celebration of the Easter Eucharist. Or, let them fall asleep in the pew. My youngest daughter didn't stay awake for an entire Easter Vigil until she was old enough to be a server!

Sixteen hundred years ago, St. Augustine described the kindling of lights on Easter Eve; "How many congregations throughout the world gather to keep this vigil! And not one is left in the dark. When the sun sets, the earth comes ablaze with a light of its own – the light of resurrection! If you are asked why Easter Eve is so important, say that Christ comes in person to shine from our lamps."

This year, how can you make Easter a feast of light at home? Candles in windows? Paper bag luminaries along the walk? Strings of clear bulbs around the front door? This year, be creative! Be the first on your block to discover the joys of Easter lights. But remember; don't turn them on until after the sun sets on Easter Eve!

To make an Easter candle for your home, decorate a white pillar candle with a cross made from five chunks of incense or clove set crosswise in the candle. Using paint, or even melted colored wax, draw an alpha and an omega (the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet) as well as the numerals 2-0-1-8 around the incense-cross in the pattern shown below. This will serve as a reminder that Christ is the beginning and the end of time and this resurrection consecrates the year. The candle is lit for the first time on Easter Eve. The candle is then lit every night in Eastertime – the 50 days from Easter to Pentecost.

On Easter Sunday, pull out all of the stops! This is the Sunday of Sundays. Christ is Risen! **Hope is Alive!** Celebrate! Fill the house with flowers, set the table with your best dishes, light your Easter candle, bless yourselves with Easter holy water, and enjoy a festive meal. Afterwards have an Easter egg hunt. An egg hunt is a search for life. Like the holy women in the garden on the day of Resurrection, we discover that life has conquered death.







The word RetrouvailleTM (pronounced re-tro-vi with a long i) is a French word meaning rediscovery. The program offers tools needed to rediscover a loving marriage relationship. Thousands of couples who have experienced difficulty in their marriage have been healed through this process.

The Retrouvaille Program consists of a weekend experience combined with a series of 6-12 post-weekend sessions over 3 months. It provides the tools to help put your marriage in order again. The main emphasis of the program is on communication in marriage between husband and wife. It will give you the opportunity to rediscover each other and examine your lives together in a new and positive way.

What the Program is not:

It is not a retreat, marriage counseling, or a sensitivity group. There are neither group dynamics nor group discussions on the weekend. It is not a time for hurting; it is a time for healing.

Who is it for?

It is for couples experiencing marital difficulties including those who are considering marriage separation and those who are already separated that want marriage help.

The Retrouvaille program is not designed nor intended for couples in a co-habitating relationship.

You will have a manual with suggestions for each day you can choose to follow or make your own.

Decorations Leader: These folks are responsible for planning and directing the decorating efforts of camp. Holy Family is the envy of most of the VBS programs in the area because of the environment we create for Spirit Camp. HOLY FAMILY TEENS SPEAK OUT

Do you ever wonder how teens view the impact Teen Faith programs have on their lives?

The fourth in our Lenten series is a reflection by *Camilla Mroczkowski*, Fremd class of 2017, now in her first year at DePaul University in Chicago. Camille writes about her experience of being a Eucharistic Minister. Currently 17 high school teens serve as Eucharistic Ministers here at Holy Family. Many others serve as EM's at their college/universities chapels and parishes.

In 1996, in the parish of Santa Maria y
Caballito Almagro, in Buenos Aires, Argentina,
a host was found to have living muscle tissue
from a human heart. It was truly alive. Such
'Eucharistic miracles' though rare, have occurred
throughout history and in many places. It is
important to remember that only after intensive
investigation, does the Church declare such a
miracle. In this instance, the renowned scientist
Ricardo Castanon Gomez, headed up the
investigation.

As Catholics, we believe that the Eucharist presented at every mass undergoes transubstantiation. Simply put, we are able to witness bread and wine be transformed into the actual body and blood of Christ. We even undergo a transformation, ourselves. Every time we accept the body and blood of Jesus, we are both verbally and physically accepting Jesus Christ into our lives.

I cannot even fathom that God finds me worthy enough to be a part of such a process. As a Eucharistic Minister, you have the power to share in the blessed transformation of your parish family. You may call them by name and actually watch them experience God's glory, right before your very eyes. If seeing is

believing, then God will allow you to see His will at work, and even engage you in helping Him in carrying out that work.

I was once told by a priest that "We come to receive the Eucharist to simultaneously receive healing." We aren't perfect because we are only human, but what a blessing it is to confidently share in imperfection, healing, and faith with believers just like you.



Through Eucharistic ministry, the Mass is experienced in a life-changing way. You realize that it is far more than simply being nourished at church. You comprehend that God is present. He is with you. He is with everyone at the mass. What greater gift could God give us undeserving humans than the gift of presence and the very privilege to give out His own body and blood? But don't take my word for it. Experience it for yourself. Become a Eucharistic Minister.

The story of the Eucharistic Miracle at *Santa Maria y Caballito Almagro in Buenos Aires* is told in detail in *Reason to Believe: A Personal Story* by Ron Tesoriero. The Auxiliary Bishop of Buenos Aires, Jorge Mario Bergoglio, now Pope Francis, was part of the scientific investigation.




