The recent shooting at Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, the 17 innocent lives lost, and the severely injured remain a focus of my prayer life. I have been reflecting a lot this Lent on how careless, violent actions and words can leave permanent scars on the hearts of God's people and take a lifetime to repair and overcome. On this Third Sunday of Lent, I am drawn to the teachings of Exodus on the 10 Commandments. Like many of you, I became familiar with these commandments in my childhood through my parents and religious educators. I was taught that these 10 commandments were a foundation for building healthy relationships within myself, God and others. Israel's ancient commandments address the very brokenness of our human nature that often compels us to "treat people like things and things like people."

The 10 Commandments remain an integral part of our faith and a much larger narrative of the Exodus story. God's chosen people are released from Egypt and freed from slavery. We hear these words prefacing the commandments in the Hebrew Scriptures: "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery." Observance of the Law becomes a healthy and appropriate human response to God's all-encompassing love.

On any given day, you and I can find it difficult to observe God's words, keeping both the letter and the spirit of what God is asking of us. In conscientiously trying to observe the commandments, we need to remember that these commandments were given to a people whom God had already saved and loved. St. Paul reminds us that God has made foolish the wisdom of the world. As St. Paul grew spiritually, he began to understand the power of Christ's triumph on the cross and the problem of trying to earn God's approval by merely "keeping" the commandments.

St. Paul acknowledged that the law, indeed, sets out God's holy expectations of the way we should act towards Him and one another. Yet, the very way in which it redirects our attention and focus towards *our own* activity and away from God's activity is the law's weakness. In and of itself the law can't lead to newness of life. It doesn't resolve the inner conflict, the conflict within our soul. This insufficiency of the Law is a real issue in Jesus' ministry and teaching. Jesus is a controversial teacher

in John's Gospel. Today's Gospel narrative of how Jesus enters the Temple and chases out the money-changers and the animal-sellers is a good example. The confrontation between Jesus and the merchants is really a conflict over priorities. Who Jesus is and what he represents clashes with the values espoused by the religious institutional leaders. Jesus challenges them.

After chasing out those who had set up their businesses in the immediate Temple area, Jesus makes a mysterious reference to the destruction of the Temple and to its being "raised" up again. Generations later, you and I understand Jesus' words to be an image of his own death and resurrection, whereas the Jewish authorities think he literally means the Jerusalem Temple. Jesus saw that this human construction of this Temple had become the object of devotion: an idol, an end in itself, rather than the living God. Despite all the good things the Temple was supposed to represent, Jesus knew that, in their misplaced devotion to a building, people had let their focus be redirected away from the divine to the human. Despite the Temple's importance, people were giving to their rites, customs, holy places, even to their laws, the special devotion due only to God.

They missed entirely the spirit of the first commandment: "You shall have no other gods before me." Our religious practices and preferences, too, can, and often do, become lesser gods, idols, for us if we make them the chief objects of our devotion. The universal temptation is to become so preoccupied with the desire to excel and to succeed as "Christians" that we begin to focus on what we think we should do, rather than on the fact that, as Paul says, "... Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God" (1 Corinthians 1:24-25) has already spelled it out for us through his death and resurrection. The commandments are important words about what God intends for us. We and the society in which we live need to take them much more seriously than we do. That being said, the reality is that Christian faith and practice entails far more than rules and regulations. It has to do primarily with relationships. The commandments are observed by inner integrity and not by mere external compliance to a rule. That is why the entire Law can be contained in the injunction to love God and neighbor, because this is a religious observance that originates in the heart. Oscar Romero, the martyred Archbishop of El Salvador said it best: "Let us not measure the church by the numbers of its members or its material buildings. The church has built many houses of worship, many seminaries, many buildings that have been taken from her. They have been stolen and turned into libraries, and barracks and markets and other things. That doesn't matter. The material walls here will be left behind in history. What matters is you, the people, your hearts, God's grace giving you truth and life. Don't measure yourselves by your numbers. Measure yourselves by the sincerity of heart with which you follow the truth and light of our divine Redeemer." (December 19, 1977).

Fourth Sunday of Lent

- 1. Chronicles is a summary of the history that was repeated over and over: People sin God is merciful people continue to sin divine punishment follows. All Ministers of Care and Others Who Take Communion to the Homebound!

Beginning with the Masses on the weekend of March 3/4, we will be making a change in the procedure for you to obtain consecrated hosts for those who are unable to attend Mass. Instead of coming to the front to receive the hosts from the priest after Communion, please present your pyx to the Eucharistic Minister when you receive Communion. The EM will place the required number of consecrated hosts in your pyx at that time. After Communion you will be asked to stand at your seat in the assembly for a blessing. You will no longer be called forward after Communion to fill your pyx. That will be done by the Eucharistic Minister when you receive Communion personally. Those who take Communion to nursing homes will continue to fill their pyx directly from the tabernacle (either before or after Mass) but will stand for the blessing after Communion.





The Heart in Spiritual Direction

Q: What is Spiritual Direction?

A: It is a companioning of two or more people in trust, seeking awareness of God's will, through the Holy Spirit.

Q: What is a Spiritual Director?

A: A person who has accomplished study and certification through an approved program to listen and recognize God's voice. They have also personally experience transformation through this spiritual journey with the Holy Spirit.

Q: How do they do this?

A: This person develops the art and skill to listen without a set of prescribed ideas, principles or intent, but instead hear and see God's working and presence in the life of another.

Q: Who is a candidate to enter Spiritual Direction?

A: One who seeks to stay authentic in their journey with the Holy Spirit and draws closer to God through their past and present life experiences.

Q: How long do I journey with the Spiritual Director?

A: Unique to each person, but practically as many one hour sessions as it takes to experience or feel refreshed in your spiritual journey and direction in your life.

Q: How do I know if Spiritual Direction is for me?

A: You are invited to "try it out".

HOLY FAMILY TEENS SPEAK OUT

Do you ever wonder how teens view the impact that Teen Faith programs have on their lives? This Lent we have asked some of our teens to tell you in their own words.

One of our most popular ministries is the Kairos Retreat. Here is reflection by Emily Kurka who participated in Kairos as both a retreatant and then as a team leader. Emily graduated from Fremd in 2018 and now attends the University of Iowa. She posted this reflection on **ODYSSEY** on January 29, 2018.

How Kairos Changed My Life by Emily Kurka

For any who do not know, Kairos is a Catholic retreat for juniors and seniors in high school. It takes place at an off-site Retreat Center over the course of 3 days and two nights. No phones are allowed on the retreat, and everyone is put purposely into small groups, with people they do not know. Over the course of the retreat you grow closer to God through talking to people who are able to lead you in the right direction.

Anyone who has been on Kairos can confidently say that it changed their life, I went as a junior in high school and can confidently say the same. At the time I signed up, I did not have much knowledge about Kairos but I knew I wanted to try it out. My whole life, I have been raised Catholic but I never really thought of the religion as my own, it was more of what I was told I was by all my family members. *Kairos took religion and made me want to be a Catholic for all the right reasons.*

There are no words to describe the impact the retreat has on all those lucky enough to go on it, but I will try my best. Since it was a church retreat, it was centered around God. However, never in the way any other retreat or church camp has been, at least for me. Kairos is not a retreat where you learn the rules of the religion and are lectured about what is right and how to exactly follow the Bible. The adults and leaders of the small group allow the kids on the retreat to hear a passage and interrupt it for themselves. The message of the passages are usually very clear, but little details and opinions vary from person to person. Through doing this, *Kairos* allows you to take your religion and make it your own, to embrace every passage and every guideline there is to offer. After Kairos, I started going to church every Sunday because I wanted to. Mass

was no longer an hour I dreaded, but an hour I never wanted to end. After allowing myself to fully engage in something that I had never experienced before, I loved going to church and learning more about the lessons God wants all his followers to know.

In addition to the religious aspects of it, Kairos allowed me to bond with people I would have never met. The three days of being so far removed from daily reality is eye opening. Throughout high school, people tend to only hang out with people in their friend group, and very rarely interact with others outside of class or sports teams. My Kairos small group included six other retreatants I did not know, two teenage leaders and two adult leaders. I am amazed how close and comfortable I got with every person in my group by the end of the

weekend. We were no longer strangers, we knew each other's fears, dreams and secrets. I was able to

to completely be myself with a group of people that had been strangers to me just a few days before. I have always been a pretty private person keeping my problems to myself. Kairos was the first time I felt comfortable enough to open up to people about things I had never talked about, even if they seemed insignificant. It is amazing that in such a short time, I found the comfort to talk about myself in ways I had not with my friends I had known my whole life. It sounds strange, but there really is something special about being removed from daily reality for a couple of days ato focus on yourself and others. There was not a single second I was worried about missing out on anything with my friends back home. Nor did I find myself craving to check social media to catch up on everyone's daily tasks.

Life when I got home, was just happier. I felt happier inside and better about myself. There is an ongoing joke that the kids are on a "Kai High" when they return home because everyone is fulfilled from the amazing past few days. I will not go into detail about the many experiences on Kairos that truly changed, because I do not wish to spoil it for someone who has not been on it yet. Kairos is not a retreat that will change into someone that obsesses over the Bible or only hangs out with people from church, but it does change your outlook at life. It opens doors to new friendships while still upholding old ones, making it the best of both

worlds. I am forever grateful I decided to go and throw myself into every activity in order to get the full benefits from the retreat.

I urge everyone that has the chance to go, TAKE IT! You will never regret it, nothing but good comes from it.

Holy Family offers two Kairos retreats each year, one in the fall and one in the spring, involving 90 to 100 teens annually. All high school juniors and seniors and their friends are welcome to attend. The parish subsidizes this retreat on average \$15,000.00 annually over and above what the retreatants contribute so that all teens who want to participate can.

Adults are always needed to be part of the retreat team or assist behind the scenes. If this is something you might be interested contact the Teen Faith Office.

Do you ever wonder how teens view the impact Teen Faith programs have on their lives?

The second in our Lenten series comes from Jake Petrie's reflection on his experience of leadership through our Journeys program Jake is a junior at Fremd

Servant Leadership by Jake Petrie

A leader is someone who is able to bring a group through thick and thin. I never really thought of myself as a leader; I preferred to be told what to do instead of choosing what to do. I couldn't bring myself to make risky moves and challenge myself. It wasn't until a weeklong camping and canoeing trip with the Chicago Voyagers' Journeys program that I was able to become a leader.

My growth to becoming a leader started one day on my second CV trip. We were canoeing on lakes in the Minnesota Boundary Waters, and I marveled at the wonders of God's creation. Lush green trees surrounded the countless glassy lakes. The water was clear and cool while the refreshing summer breeze flitted over my skin. It was the perfect atmosphere for a time of reflection and faith.

A few days into the trip, our group found a campsite around lunchtime, so we had all afternoon to hang out and have fun. A couple of my friends and I tried to see how many people we could get to stand on the gunwales (sides) of the canoe. So we paddled out away from shore and climbed up on the canoe. After three of us were standing on the canoe we lost balance and tipped over.

The normal procedure for rescuing a canoe is to do a T-rescue with another canoe, but we only had the one canoe so we couldn't do that. We also could have swum it back to shore, but I was intent on flipping it back over so we could paddle back to shore. At first I was scared that no one would follow my lead because I had never taken charge before, but once I started telling them what to do they listened to me. It took a lot of work, but I finally was able to convince everyone to give it a try and lead the side and we were able to climb into the canoe. We were then able to paddle back to shore with our heads held

able to paddle back to shore with our heads held high. When we got back I realized that I had finally broken out of my shell and took charge of the group. This was the first time I stepped out of my comfort zone and took the role of leadership. My eyes were finally opened up to the possibility that I could be a leader.

Throughout the rest of the trip I became a leader in different ways, but I felt especially called to be a servant leader. I would sometimes take charge of the group. Other times, I was the supporter, helping people portage (carry) their canoes or make dinner. I would also allow others to grow in their leadership abilities by stepping back and letting others take charge or shine. For example, I really wanted to portage the heavy canoe from lake to lake all the time as a personal challenge, but I realized that sometimes it is more important to give others opportunities to grow. I realized that in that scenario, leadership meant stepping aside. Servant leaders put others first. This attitude helped me grow as a person throughout this trip and now throughout life.

Now as a junior at Fremd High School, I put my leadership skills from this trip into my everyday life. I currently am a choir sectional leader. This means that I lead the tenor section whenever our director isn't there. This was something I never would have taken the initiative to do before I went on this Chicago Voyagers trip.

Before Chicago Voyagers, I was someone who avoided leadership like the plague, I would much rather have been a follower than a leader. Now, with all of the confidence and experience I've gained through this program, I jump into leadership roles every chance I can. I only have been willing to accept these leadership roles because of what I learned on that Chicago Voyagers trip. I am so very grateful for my family, friends, and neighbors that have supported me to go on a CV adventure. I hope that everyone is able to experience such an amazing trip and learning opportunity like I have. I am extremely grateful for the chance to discover my leadership strengths through this amazing organization.

2018 Lenten Social Justice Project "Peaceful Pathways"

This Lenten season, walk with us along "Peaceful Pathways", our social justice project. We're joining Cardinal Cupich's Violence Prevention Initiative (endorsed by Pope Francis) targeting vulnerable, at risk youth in Chicago's most troubled neighborhoods. Although "violence prevention" describes our intent, "Peaceful Pathways" describes our approach. Our contributions will support two highly successful local programs: Strong Futures on the south side of Chicago (www.saintsabinapeacemakers. org/strong-futures), and The Peace Corner Youth Center (www.thepeacecorner.org) on the west side.

The Auburn Gresham neighborhood is located on Chicago's south side with a population of 45,842. The median income is \$37,849 with 32.4% living below the poverty level. 39.6% have less than a high school education and there are 56.7 homicides per 100,000 people. **Strong Futures** first began in June, 2016 as a pilot by the City of Chicago and Department of Family and Support Services (DFSS) in partnership with St. Sabina Church. Strong Futures addresses the needs of disconnected youth and young adults, between the ages of 18-28, who are justice-involved and/or have other barriers to stability, by connecting them with full-time employment. Strong Futures provides intensive coaching, comprehensive wrap-around services, and support that will enable them to stabilize economically, retain employment, and develop into productive, responsible contributors in society. 


