In the Eucharist we are changed. From the Eucharist we are sent.

This weekend we celebrate the **Feast of Corpus Christi**, reflecting on the mystery of the Eucharist and its meaning in our daily lives as members of Holy Family Catholic Community. The Eucharist encapsulates the great intimacy of both our personal and communal relationship with Jesus. We worship as a faith community in a variety of ways: when we welcome and greet one another, through our lively and uplifting music and song, the richness and beauty of art and environment, stunning visuals, praise, adoration, petition, seeking forgiveness, healing, blessing, through laughter, tears, our listening and reflecting, and the transforming of our daily lives (the Mass never ends...).

Our worship, therefore, at Holy Family connects us more deeply to one another, enhances the way we live, and creates outreach through social justice. First and foremost, the Eucharist is intended to always be an *inclusive*, *not exclusive*, celebration to which all are invited, welcomed, and belong. Our faith teaches us that Christ did not die for any one select group of people, but for *all* people. The Last Supper symbolically represents all meals that Christ shared with the poor, the marginalized, and sinners in the Gospel passages.

Every week we gather around a common table of diverse people. At this table, the dignity of each person is celebrated, that we are all made in the image and likeness of God and are redeemed by the blood of Christ. The Eucharist is, therefore, a deeply transformative encounter that alters our lives, both as individual believers and as a whole Body. We were each made as a gift to be broken and shared for the benefit of others. We are called to engage in that difficult, even dangerous, process of conversion, moving beyond our inclinations towards selfishness and individualism and replace them with selflessness and a genuine concern for the needs of one another. When we are dismissed from the Eucharist, we go forth into the world as missionaries of Christ's love and become missionaries of peace and justice. We are all commissioned to continue the transformation of the world and to contribute to the building of a more just society— to proclaim a message of hope, and to establish as completely as possible the reign of God in the here-and-now. In the Eucharist we are changed. From the Eucharist we are sent.

The Eucharist and Social Justice – worship of God and service to our neighbor – must go together and not be separated. Without the former, the latter becomes empty and loses perspective; without the latter, the former remains incomplete and an inauthentic celebration of Christ's selfless sacrifice. Christ in the Eucharist is both drawing us to Himself and driving us outward to make Him present in the brothers and sisters of every nation. The liturgy can never merely be understood as an end in itself but as a means by which we encounter God and are transformed into His instruments, cooperating with God to establish a more just world.

At Holy Family, we have three beautiful worship spaces to honor the Eucharist: the main church for Sunday worship, the chapel for daily mass, and the adoration chapel where people find solace and strength in the Eucharist. This weekend at all the masses we recognize those who are devoted to Eucharistic adoration. This devotion can be explained in the following manner:

'In proper context, Eucharistic adoration makes us more aware, or leads us to a deeper understanding of the presence of Christ in the sacrament of the Eucharist. When we concentrate on the Blessed Sacrament ... we meditate on Christ crucified and risen. The theological purpose of Eucharistic adoration, then, exists in the remembrance, celebration, and affirmation of the Paschal Mystery, our Christian story of redemption' -- (Therese Borchard, Our Catholic Devotions, Crossroads, N.Y., 1998). 'Eucharistic adoration turns the attention of the faithful to the Mass, the Eucharistic sacrifice, which is the source and summit of the whole of Christian life' (Vatican II, Document on the Church, #11).

Following the 11:00am mass this Sunday, we will have a traditional procession from the church to the courtyard where we will pause and have some reflective music and prayers, and then continue our parish procession to the Chapel. This is an opportunity for the community of Holy Family to experience adoration in its proper form, to both nourish our personal faith and to enhance our connection to the social concerns in our world. The Eucharistic body and the body of every person are both the body of Christ Himself. Therefore, Christ's presence in the Eucharist is intrinsically connected to His presence in the poor and vulnerable. May all forms of worship around *the Eucharist* remind us that we are changed and from the Eucharist we are sent.


"Yes!!! If you let it, the program and the process has the power to change you."

Faith Formation for Generation Z: Part II



In Part I of this series, which ran in our bulletin the past two weeks, we identified Gen X as the youngest and largest generational cohort on the planet, 20 % of the US population but 36.3% of the world's population. They are the first truly "post-Christian" generation in American history and seriously question the need for religious faith. This poses real challenges for parents and Religious Educators when forming this generation in spiritual practices that will be meaningful to them and providing them with a core set of beliefs and morals that will enhance their lives.

Though suspicious of religious faith Generation Z values spirituality.

At first glance the research can be confusing. Gen Z is twice as likely to self- identify as atheist (as compared to former generations). Yet when affiliated with religious faith, they are more likely to be engaged than their parents (i.e. 41% say they attend weekly religious services, compared with 18% of millennials at the same ages). This trend is visible among our Holy Family teens. Many of our teens remain active and engaged in parish life even after their parents move to the sidelines. The reason they give for doing so is the sense of community they experience - the connections they make.

How do we reconcile these apparent inconsistencies?

Learning more about what makes this youngest generation tick may help us better understand their wariness of traditional models of religious faith and guide our efforts in forming them as modern Christian disciples.

The most ethnically and racially diverse group ever, this cohort feels positive about the idea of increasing racial and gender diversity. They see themselves as global citizens. Having grown up immersed in social media they are highly interactive and thrive on connection, resulting in their highly developed social and emotional intelligence. Many leave religious traditions because of religious opposition to LGBTQ rights, their ignorance on the subject of sex education and science literacy, their hypocrisy on opposing both abortion and contraception and their treatment of women, people of color and those who do not agree with them. This is true of most Holy Family teens. Generally more

We need to stop pretending that what they want is entertainment rather than real engagement with honest intellectual exchange about questions of faith.

Looking for an alternative to weekly Faith classes?

Why not consider homeschooling for Religious Education @ Holy Family

Why home school for religious education?

Teaching religious education at home is a wonderful option for many families. Home schooling, with the parent as catechist, has unique benefits and is still seen as a partnership between parents and the parish.

Benefits of home schooling for religious education

- > To have more quality family time
- > To give children with special needs one-on-one attention
- To eliminate scheduling conflicts
- > To provide stability in the midst of frequent moves

Does the Catholic Church allow home schooling for Religious Education?

Absolutely. The Second Vatican Council document on Christian education, *Gravissimum Educationis*, states that parents, society, and the Church all have a duty regarding the education of children, but that the primary and principal duty belongs to parents.

What is the role of the Parish community in home schooling for religious education and what is expected of parents who choose to home school their children for religious education?

The **General Directory for Catechesis (GCD)** reminds us that education in the faith is carried out in different ways in different places. At Holy Family we realize that much if not most education in faith takes place outside a classroom setting: in the family, in the neighborhood, in the larger parish community. It is in these settings that children see and experience the faith <u>lived</u>.

- Liturgy in the parish community is where the proclamation of the Gospel begins and where we, regardless of age, are invited to conversion and to follow Christ.
 - 1. Families who home-school for religious education will be asked to make a commitment to participate in the Sunday assembly on a regular basis.



- Genuine religious education <u>informs</u>, <u>forms</u>, and <u>transforms</u>! The Church calls all religious educators, including parents to foster both knowledge and understanding of Catholic teaching and practice, and develop an appreciation for Sacred Scripture and tradition in young people.
 - 2. Families who home-school for religious education will be asked use catechistical materials provided by the parish, submit completed work online and meet with one of the Faith or Teen Faith staff at regular intervals.
 - Bringing children to the parish programs for sacramental preparation further enriches their lives by bringing them into contact with other adults and with peers on the same faith journey.



3. Families who home school their children for religious education are asked to participate in the parish-based sacramental preparation programs. In the case of Confirmation, home schooled students will be asked to take part in community service opportunities, attend the FLAME 1 & 2 Retreats, and attend one of the PIZZA WITH THE PASTOR sessions.

The cost of the home-schooling option for Religious Education at Holy Family

- **Tuition:** \$200.00 per <u>family</u> per year (a \$100.00 non-refundable fee is due at the time of registration)
- > Instructional Materials: \$20.00 per child per year
- > Sacramental and retreat fees are in addition to tuition.


Congratulations to the HFCA Class of 2018!

This family consists of a single mixed race (white and black) 24 year old female and her two son's ages 7 and 5. Client became homeless due to emotional abuse from her ex and his family with whom they lived. Her oldest child is from another relationship.

This mom is certainly on the right track and doing well reaching her goals. New Hope asked her to speak at a recent New Hope Fundraiser due to the progress she is making. She recently purchased a car and no longer has to pay for an Uber or friends to take her places. Having her own transportation has brought a sense of relief to our mom and the children. She was offered a promotion to become a full-time manager. She is currently learning the additional skills needed for her new position.

School is going well, however, she had to drop two classes because of her work trip. She reported that she missed out on important classes which she could not make up so she will re-enroll next semester. Unfortunately, this pushes her graduation date back, but she could not miss her job training trip.

Goals:

- Save up at least 3 month's rent/saving IRS tax refund
- Attend work and school as scheduled
- Apply for low income housing
