#### "...unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you."

In today's gospel, Jesus drives these words home with clarity and repetition. "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day." Imagine hearing these words for the very first time. Imagine Jesus speaking directly to you right now. Try to hear these words without any previous knowledge, understanding or experience of the Eucharist.

What would your response be? The difficulty for us today is that we are hearing these words as "churched" people who largely let the bewilderment of their meaning land around us without much reaction. However, we know from hearing today's gospel that some people in the crowd took much offense to these words of Jesus and stopped following him. Jesus used bread in today's gospel to compare believers with unbelievers. Believers ate the bread that gives new life. Unbelievers took offense and did not. Believers shared a table of fellowship centered on Christ the Lord. Unbelievers refused to become a part of the Body they were asked to consume.

Jesus used this idea of the living God to describe himself as the "living" bread from heaven. He also bridged the title "I AM" with bread to his great mission, to be the bread from heaven to feed the whole world. Those who chose not to eat or drink would not have life because they would have no intimacy with the "Son of Man." Taken together as a Semitic phrase, the term "flesh and blood" referred to the entire person. The phrase, "Son of Man" is a reference to the Messiah referred to in the book of Daniel. The title, "Son of Man" made Jesus human like everyone else. But it also made him God's Chosen One. With these two converging meanings, "Son of Man" and "God's Chosen One" made Jesus a unique instrument for universal salvation. Those who had direct intimate union with the "Son of Man" had eternal life and possessed God's very life. This graphic image connected the eater with the food, the believer to Christ. The believer must eat the flesh of Jesus. John's gospel therefore uses the image of consuming the "bread of life" to be our "true food" and "true drink." In the context of ancient times and this verse, the word "true" meant "only." The body and blood of Christ, then, were the only

food and drink that really mattered. The Eucharist is the high point of our Christian life at Holy Family Parish because it unites all of us believers with Christ himself. When we have direct intimate union with the Son of Man we have eternal life, and we therefor possess God's very life. How can we make the body and blood of Christ we receive at Communion come alive this week?

Can you answer these questions on the Mass? Answers following in next week's bulletin.

1. Why does Jesus give himself to us as food and drink?

2. Why is the Eucharist not only a meal but also a sacrifice?

3. When the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ, why do they still look and taste like bread and wine?

4. Does the bread cease to be bread and the wine cease to be wine?

5. Is it fitting that Christ's Body and Blood become present in the Eucharist under the appearances of bread and wine?

6. Are the consecrated bread and wine "merely symbols"?

7. Do the consecrated bread and wine cease to be the Body and Blood of Christ when the Mass is over?

8. Why are some of the consecrated hosts reserved after the Mass?

9. What are appropriate signs of reverence with respect to the Body and Blood of Christ?

10. If someone without faith eats and drinks the consecrated bread and wine, does he or she still receive the Body and Blood of Christ?

11. If a believer who is conscious of having committed a mortal sin eats and drinks the consecrated bread and wine, does he or she still receive the Body and Blood of Christ?

12. Does one receive the whole Christ if one receives Holy Communion under a single form?13. Is Christ present during the celebration of the Eucharist in other ways in addition to his Real Presence in the Blessed Sacrament?

14. Why do we speak of the "Body of Christ" in more than one sense?

15. Why do we call the presence of Christ in the Eucharist a "mystery"?

# We Can't Wait to Welcome our Students!


While we all sometimes think we would love just a *little* more summer, we are also so excited to welcome all of our new and returning families to HFCA this week.


