

Love is the action we are called to partake in daily.

On this 27th Sunday in ordinary time, the Gospel of Mark calls us to reflect on the power of **Love in action**. All of us have a natural desire to be loved and nurtured. Therefore, love is essential and critically important to our growth and development as human beings. It is a key component to being mentally healthy and having a positive sense of well-being. Though there is no one definition to describe love, it is characterized by a sense of attachment and affection towards somebody or something. So strong is the feeling of love that it is said to "make the world go around."

One form that the need for love takes is through physical contact, the healthy desire for appropriate touch. Psychological studies have found that babies who are deprived of contact comfort, particularly during the first six months after they are born, grow up to have psychological impairments. Given the importance of the need to be loved, a significant determinant of our happiness is whether we feel loved and cared for by others. In our pursuit of the need to be loved, we also have a parallel need, to love and care for others. This desire, it turns out, is just as strong as the need to be loved and nurtured. It is the desire to love and take care of others. We know that the desire to love and care for others is hard-wired and deep-seated because fulfillment of this desire enhances our happiness levels. Expressing love or compassion for others benefits not just the recipient of affection, but also its initiator. Small acts of kindness are proven to generate as much happiness as greater acts.

In an interesting set of psychological studies, participants were either given \$5 or \$20 as part of an experiment. Participants in both groups were then asked to either spend the money on themselves or on others. Those who spent the money on others, it turned out, grew happier than those who spent it on themselves. More interestingly, the *amount* of money spent on others didn't make a difference to happiness levels: those who spent \$5 derived just as much happiness as those who spent \$20. Human beings have an innate quality of giving and feeling love.

As members of Holy Family Community, we seek wholeness through our love and service to God and one another. We do this through the selfless love of our spouses, children, family, community, and the higher calling to love our enemies as ourselves. **Love is the action we are called to partake in daily.** We have an unremitting hunger for something that lasts and is reliable. But as many people have come to know, when we love, there is no guarantee that we will be shielded from the harsh realities of separation, heartache, and loss.

Jesus in today's gospel specifically addresses the heartfelt and difficult place of divorce in the lives of individuals, families and communities at large. Divorce in the first century was a generally accepted part of life among Jews and within the wider Greco-Roman culture. Some writers and public leaders of Jesus' time spoke out against divorce as being bad for society but, for the most part, people debated only details of its legal basis. In today's gospel, Jesus turns the conversation with the Pharisees away from a legal foundation for divorce to God's positive design for marriage. Jesus describes marriage as a strong and unifying bond between two people. It transcends contractual obligations, economic utility, and is something deeply rooted in human identity.

Jesus' teaching thus impels us to promote and foster healthy marriages within our communities, and in the cases of divorce and remarriage, to extend compassion and facilitate healing. Jesus explains that God's main objective is to provide wholeness and protection for all those who are most vulnerable. It is no coincidence that the Gospel of Mark tells us another story about Jesus blessing children. Children in the ancient world had few rights and essentially no social status. The disciples themselves were even obstructing people from bringing their children to Jesus. But Jesus reprimands them to not hinder the children from coming to him, and blesses out of his deep concern and love for the vulnerable and all who are at risk for exploitation. The persons on the edge of humanity (women and children), and for the Gospel of Mark (any outsider marginalized by ritual, tradition, ethnicity, race, religion, gender), will now find a place in the Kingdom of God.

One of the primary theological challenges from reading this week's gospel is the appeal Jesus makes to God's will, not God's law. How we determine the distinction between these two is at the heart of the debate when it comes to thinking about marriage in our current context. The reality of separation and divorce can make someone feel like an outsider. The theological point in the Gospel of Mark is not God stipulating idyllic models of relationships, but God saying to you and me, "I am here, in my Son, to be in relationship with you. Nothing can separate us any longer."

28th Sunday in Ordinary Time

5. This Gospel reading from Mark has always stirred questions and debate, since most of us are planning on salvation. Regardless of what you own or possess today, how does this passage make you feel? Should you be doing more?



That Precious Bond

The vocation of grandparenting

Each year Fr. Terry meets with every FLAME II Faith class (and now he is often joined by Fr. Rich) in a gathering we call *Pizza with the Pastor*. Early on a weeknight, before the round of parish meetings begin, Fr. Terry invites the teens to his house for a meal and a

conversation. As part of that conversation he often asks, *"Who are your spiritual heroes?"* By far the most common answer the teens give is a grandparent or grandparents. What makes them spiritual heroes to their grandchildren?


- Their fidelity to love "I know my grandpa always has my back."
- Their prayer life "My grandmother prays every day. She is the only one I ever ask to pray for me, because I know she will do it"
- Their commitment to their religious beliefs, especially in times of hardship or struggle "My grandfather always tells me that you know if you really have faith when your back is against the wall."
- Their willingness to share their faith with their grandchildren "My grandparents never tell me what to do, they share what they did when facing something similar. It's really cool."
- Their devotion to the Eucharist "My grandpa never misses Mass and my Grandma goes to Mass every day. My grandpa says, 'If you put God first everything else will fall into place."
- Their service to others "My grandmother is always doing stuff for other people, thinking about others instead of herself. I really admire that about her."

The sincerity with which our teens share these stories is very touching. As you look around at the group you see them all nodding and often hear the phrase, 'mine do too'. The fact is, and every research study done on the role grandparents play in their grandchildren's lives backs this up, grandparents are bearers of

- Connection and continuity
- Family heritage and tradition
- Spiritual wisdom and faith

What makes religious faith, heritage and tradition such a compelling matter in the relationship between grandparent and grandchild? According to

Arthur Kornhaber, M.D. "...what transpires between grandparents and grandkids is unique and powerful, making grandparents ideally suited to the role of "spiritual guide. There's something cosmic about that bond."



For psychologist Carolyn Newberger, an involved grandma herself, it's primarily about continuity. As a grandparent, Newberger says, "I stand in a place that

stretches behind me and ahead of me. Through me, my grandchildren will carry forward what I remember." That link to living memory can often stretch across centuries. Dr. Peg Hanrahan remembers her grandmother, who was born in 1888, telling stories of her grandparents who were both born before 1810. Those stories, now 200 years old, is quite a legacy to have been given, says Dr. Peg, "and I feel a responsibility to pass those stories on to my own nieces and nephews and their children." That sense of responsibility as the link between generations creates a precious bond. So to all you grandparents we say, you have more spiritual influence on your grandkids than you may realize - don't take that lightly!

HFCA Connects with the Community to Help Others

Last spring, HFCA was approached by the McGraw Foundation and the Max McGraw Wildlife Foundation to help them advance the study of aquaponics in underserved schools in Chicago.

Knowing HFCA was the first middle school in Illinois to earn AdvancED STEM certification, the foundations suggested that in exchange for donating a complete aquaponics system to HFCA, our middle school teachers would develop lesson plans that would accompany the aquaponics units being shipped to other schools.

This project was an ideal opportunity to enhance our STEM program while also being aligned with our goal of combining learning with service to others. Middle School teachers, Mrs. Eileen Paparone and Mrs. Jeanne Olmstead developed a Farm-to-Table STEM unit using aquaponics. This unit has the added benefit of being able to eat what we grow!

The ministry continues to thrive since its inception 32 years ago. It is the longest continuously running job support group in the Greater Chicago area with a reputation of being one of the best to attend. The uniqueness of the group is that besides helping people in their job search - resume/ handbill writing, research, interviewing, networking, referrals - we are also there for them as they go through their emotional ups and downs. We journey with them through their difficult times. The ministry also coordinates with other job support/ networking groups in the Greater Chicago area including IDES, Illinois Department of Employment Security.

Our 24/7Advisors are multi-denominational, multi-ethnic and from diverse professional backgrounds who are retired, working or job seekers. They have themselves been helped by the ministry and are now paying forward. Majority are not from Holy Family. Our attendees come from the Greater Chicago area. They are also multi-denominational, multi-ethnic, experienced professionals and fresh graduates in search of entry level to very senior executive positions in small to large size corporations, government as well as nonprofit organizations.

Unfortunately, we lost our founding member Brian Healy last January. Long-time leaders, Jerry, Gary and Frank, have fully assumed the leadership role and do the behind the scenes coordination and administrative work.

Jerry manages our Yahoo Job Support Group

which has over 700 members and is also the means of communicating job openings and other networking opportunities to the members.

We All Fit

The focal point of our Fall liturgical environment is an art piece entitled We All Fit. It's a collection of paintings created by the members of the Art & Environment Ministry. We gathered one morning to learn a painting technique called "pour painting" and by lunchtime we'd created 24 paintings! The concept of combining our work grew to become the heart of our Fall environment when one of our members pointed out how all the paintings fit together.

All of our paintings were created from the same color palette. Through the technique of pouring the paint onto the canvas, the colors moved, swirled, and separated – and created a unique, individual painting. Because they all began from the same core, the same palette, they belong together.

We took the paintings one step further, though. We laid them out on a table and added a trail of a different color mix onto each canvas. We gave them a reason to really fit together – not just a common core, but also a common distinction.

Within our Ministry, as with any group of people, we are all individuals with our unique talents and skills. That Monday morning in the basement we brought not just our talents but also our aches, our joys, our fears, our stories – all the tiny scraps of our souls that make us who we are. And we created a harmony out of our individuality.

It's the same within the larger community of Holy Family. We all share a common core, our humanness. Beyond that, we share a common distinction, our faith in God. Because of those two commonalities, just like the collection of paintings on the wall, despite our individual leanings, our strengths and weaknesses, our histories, We All Fit. We all belong.


