What kind of king is Christ? For some, the title given to the savior of the world makes sense. For others, including myself, we have to do a little theological and spiritual work to see Christ as a king. We are probably overrun by powerful, if not negative, images and experiences of kings and this tends to be prominent in our prayerful reflection of Jesus Christ as one.

Notice that I added Jesus to the title in the last reference, only Christ in the first two. This two-fold title gives us all some insight as we focus on this last weekend of the liturgical year before embarking on a new year and the adventure of Advent and Christmas, and beyond. The Jesus of history who was born and walked this earth morphed into the Christ who was acknowledged by the church and the world as the anointed one (thus the title referring to the sacred oil and gesture of naming the king), fulfilling the Old Testament prophesies and being more of a King than David ever was.

Christ indicates legacy and permanence. Jesus indicates a certain historical time and a prophet who gives us timeless messages and touching miracles.

So in light of the Christ that is easier to connect with the title king, Msgr. Charles Pope helps in his breakdown of Christ as three types of kings, based on the scriptures we hear this weekend. He tells us that that Christ is:

A Caring King – from our first reading from Ezekiel, "I myself will look after and tend my sheep..."

A Conquering King –"...he has destroyed every sovereignty...he must reign until he has conquered all...even death."

A Concealed King – He is in the needy, the poor, the oppressed and the humble. He promises us an inheritance in a kingdom prepared from the foundation of the world, a kingdom for all of us."

I would like to add that Christ is:

An Eternal King – a significant aspect of eternity is truth, and Jesus ends his statement in the Gospel that he has come to "testify to the truth." Few things are more eternal than the truth, and Jesus Christ will always lead us to truth. He tells us through the lens of Mark, "For this I came into the world. For this I was born, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."

As Advent begins next weekend, please be attentive to the environment of our beautiful church that is centered around the small word BE. Like Advent itself, this word will be used as a precursor to something more. It points to and helps us prepare for a more important reality. Several words will follow the word BE. These words coincide with key scriptural messages and will vary each week.

For example, the first week of Advent encourages us to BE Alert. We must engender a spirit of deeper awareness to more fully prepare for the miracle of God taking a risk and becoming one of us this Christmas.

We have been hosting an event for men for several years called The Gathering. Often women ask when we will hold an event for women. Although I am more supportive of adult events for women and men together, we are very excited to welcome and invite women to "The Three Wise Women of the Nativity Story" as a part of our Advent by Candlelight series for women here at Holy Family on Tuesday, December 4 from 7:00-9:00pm. The evening will be led by Mary McKeon who shared a reflection with us on the Feast of Mary Magdala this past July and she is on the staff at the Bellarmine Jesuit Retreat House just up the road from us on Lake Cook Road in Barrington. Mary will share insights of the role of three great women, Mary, the Mother of Jesus, Elizabeth her cousin and the mother of John the Baptist, and the Prophetess Anna. All three play a unique role in the Nativity story. Wine and hors d'oeuvres will be served in the Narthex following Mary's presentation which will be held in the Church. I am inviting ALL women of the parish to attend and I am challenging both women and men to personally invite other women to attend. This promises to be an enriching evening that will help prepare your heart for Advent and Christmas. There is no charge for the evening and details will be in the bulletin as the evening gets closer.



It is difficult to see it from here, I know. but trust me when I say this blessing is inscribed on the horizon. Is written on that far point you can hardly see. Is etched into a landscape whose contours you cannot know from here. All vou know is that it calls you, draws you, pulls you toward

What if the first Divine utterance was simply



What if that declaration expresses the breadth of Divine will

Being is our essence. Being enfolds our body and spirit. This is the way we were made. Our being lies within the Divine who is our source and destiny. This is why Augustine insight that the restlessness that is part of human existence is a divine gift, is still helpful to contemporary seekers and believers. This **Holy longing** is the desire to be filled and fulfilled. Why did the Divine choose to make us this way? Some say, because searching, reaching beyond ourselves, being drawn into the mysterious and unknown is what leads us to encounter the divine fire that blazes in everything and everyone. The insatiability of our hunger stems from the fact that **nothing short of union with all that is (BEing) can satisfy our longing.** This is why the first line of the first reading of the first Sunday of Advent proclaims

> □The days are coming, says the LORD, when I will fulfill the promise□ □

Religious and spiritual traditions are not the divine fire; they point to it. If they are not willing to be beacons that direct hearts and minds to the signs of the presence of the divine they are irrelevant; if they try to interfere with or misrepresent Divine intention they will perish. The **Holy Spirit** resides within the Church in the hearts of Christs disciples. The Holy Spirit animates, awakens, guides, strengthens, protects and accompanies us as Church, but **we are not the Spirit** that stirs up the divine spark and sets the cosmos ablaze. This is why the Gospel next week tells us

Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy from the anxieties of daily life

Our task this Advent is to **Be** and **Become** who God meant us to be, individually and collectively, and in doing so set the world ablaze!

Her children are doing just fine. Her eldest son is one of the most outgoing kids in his class and doing well in reading. Her youngest son has been diagnosed with hearing issues and is seeing an audiologist. He is also working with a speech therapist. Our mom is working hard to help her son overcome these issues.

Goals:

- Obtain a CNA certificate
- Apply for low income housing
- · Follow up with audiology appointments and speech therapy for her son

Family #31

This family consists of a 24 year old female and her two sons ages 7 and 5.

Our mom is hanging in there! She is working hard on looking for employment. She is registered with a couple of different temp agencies and has had two promising interviews. She has enjoyed the administrative positions the most. She feels if all fails that she can easily find a serving job. Ideally, she wants to find a 9 to 5 job so that she can spend more time with her children. Also, a 9-5 job is better hours for childcare. She is feeling better mentally after experiencing the loss of her previous job. She reports that she will be back on top of her game very soon.

Her children are doing great, especially in school! They are doing well because they have been spending a lot of time together.

Goals:

- Save up at least 3 month's rent
- Attend work and school as scheduled
- Apply for low income housing
- Look for full time employment
- Save up for another car

JUST "BE" FOR ADVENT!

We Christians hold a great festival during the winter solstice, the shortest days of the year. We call this festival "Christmas," meaning the "feast of Christ." It takes several weeks to **prepare** and several weeks to **celebrate**. It is, undoubtedly, one of our favorite feasts. It is very important, however, that we not confuse the **preparing** and the **celebrating**.

The weeks of preparation are called **Advent**, the season of growing darkness before the solstice. The weeks of celebration are called **Christmastime**, the season of growing light after the solstice. Perhaps it comes down to something basic: We are Children of the Light.

Of course, there's a great contrast between these two seasons of our faith and the commercial "holiday season." The "holiday season" usually begins in early November and then comes to a crashing halt on December 26. And, unfortunately, it is most often filled with great stress and fatigue because the preparing is usually focused on cleaning, shopping, decorating, baking, and partying. Yes, even partying can be stressful and exhausting! **We need something different!** We need to **BE surprised, satisfied, filled, loved!** We need Advent. We need a spiritual "oasis" to which we can retreat during all the craziness and just **BE**. Without it we stop being who we are: a people who are waiting in joyful anticipation, **alert** to Emmanuel, God-With-Us. **And we need Christmastime.** We need a festival that runs beyond a single day or week. In the many days of Christmastime we shout loud and clear that Jesus Christ is born; **love** is born in human form. The reign of God is here among us, in our flesh and blood. That is why we have star-topped trees, decked halls, and bountiful tables.

Advent, however, cannot exist if we jump the gun on Christmas. And Christmastime cannot exist if we are already tired of it by December 25. These two seasons require each other. Advent, and a new church year, begins next Sunday, December 2. Commit to making Advent a little different this year. **BE** still and **BE** surprised by what the Spirit of God has to say to you. Find your moment to **BE** here at Holy Family. Invite someone else who might need some spiritual enrichment...a family member, a friend, a neighbor... to attend at least one mass with you during the season. BE your Story! BE your Journey! BE for Others! BE Love! BE who you are as a Child of God! And may the lights of the Advent wreath lead us all to the Star of Bethlehem, the Light of the World. -Deacon Dennis Brown
