Fr. Terry Keehan

There is a universal message in the story of the Wizard of Oz. I trust almost all of you are familiar with the story. If you aren't, please watch the movie. After a long, strange trip, Dorothy returns home to Kansas completing, and perhaps complementing, her initial desire to get away from home. She encounters many colorful characters on her journey, including one very evil (a witch), and one very deceitful (who redeems himself), as well as companions she meets along the way who are also lost. Finally, after returning to the security of home, surrounded by the people she loves the most, she proclaims, "Next time I go searching for my heart's desire, I won't look any further than my own back yard."

Dorothy returns home as a changed person. The experience of the trip away brings profound insights. She goes away, and because she goes away she is somehow more deeply appreciative of what she has upon her return.

Hopefully our journey of Lent has been somewhat like that. Easter invites us to return to life, but the journey, the Radical Journey of the Heart this Lent, has deepened our appreciation for life. The symbols of the Easter Vigil help us to ritualize this return.

Light! The Paschal Candle (also called the Easter Candle) is brought into church in the darkness of the Easter Vigil night. Its light is shared and it spreads throughout the church to illumine our lives. Where there is light, there is no darkness. The light of Christ dispels all darkness, and the light within each of us and the collective light of our community can give life to a sometimes dark world. This light shines particularly bright as we move through the seven weeks of Easter—towards the fiery light of Pentecost.

Water! Baptismal water is another key symbol of new life. Our fonts have been dry all Lent, coinciding with the dry, desert experience of Jesus for forty days. We open up our font at Easter and gather around the large pool that symbolizes our community specifically, and all life more generally. Our large font is filled with water, and where there is water, there is life. Each of us was immersed in the water of our mother's womb. We could not separate life itself from that water. Plants and other vegetation thrive with water. Lakes and oceans comprise a large portion of the surface of the earth. Our bodies are 50-60% water. Water

nurtures, water heals, water soothes. In very large quantities, and in certain flooding situations, water can destroy. There is power in water and the Easter season brings us much water through several rituals. They include being sprinkled as we renew our baptismal promises and gathering around the large font in the middle of our church, reminding us that we are in THIS together. THIS can be many things, but during Easter, THIS is primarily Life. New Life!

Just like Dorothy in the Wizard of Oz, we can return to life enriched by a great variety of experiences, some very challenging, that can help us appreciate just how new life can be.

Another aspect of Easter and new life that has inspired me recently is how it can raise us up. Many of my peers are currently or in the process of becoming grandparents. It is absolutely amazing how new life can raise us up and give us new energy. The enthusiasm with which new parents and grandparents welcome birth, infancy and childhood seems to raise them to new heights. It gives new energy, perhaps with greater appreciation, following many life experiences that come with age.

New Life at Holy Family

Please be attentive to the many programs, ministries and activities that we offer here at Holy Family that can raise you up spiritually. Easter can bring both a challenge and an invitation for new spiritual life, and simply getting involved in something that you are not currently involved in that is a connection between a God given talent of yours and a need in our community, can bring surprising newness.

Perhaps your spiritual life needs a refresher. Consider joining or even forming a Small Christian Community, being an usher at Mass, participating in one of our many Adult Faith programs, our Beloved Retreat, or even being a Catechist for some of our younger parishioners. The possibilities are many! Try it! Try something new!

Speaking of new!!! Our Mass of Rock is a new liturgical experience filled with new energy and enthusiasm which we kicked off on January 27. The next Mass of Rock will be on Pentecost Sunday, June 9 at 4:00pm. Please pray with us in a Rockin' way and bring friends.

2019 Lenten Social Justice Project Kino Border Initiative and Holy Family Fund

Humanize the immigration issue; recognize its complexity; accompany people on their journey.

This Lenten season, Holy Family walked a path alongside individuals and families striving to live a life that is productive, strengthens the family unit, and maintains inherent dignity - all within an environment that is safe and nurturing. Our intent was to humanize the immigration issue and to recognize its complexity, while emphasizing accompaniment of people on their journey.

Respecting the human dignity of every individual is the first and foremost Catholic social teaching. Throughout Lent, we addressed six of the seven main Catholic social teachings. These teachings include: Respect-

ing Human Dignity; Call to Family, Community, and Participation; Rights and Responsibilities; Option for the Poor and Vulnerable; The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers; and living in Solidarity with our brothers and sisters everywhere.

Our goal is to raise a total of \$25,000 for the two programs – the **Kino Border Initiative** and the **Holy Family Fund**. Both programs are supported by Catholic Extension Society.

Kino Border Initiative (KBI) promotes U.S./Mexico border and immigration policies that affirm the dignity of the human person and a spirit of bi-national solidarity through direct assistance and education. Every year, thousands of migrant men, women and children are deported to Nogales, Sonora, Mexico or arrive in the city fleeing from Central America. They often arrive with only the clothes on their backs and a small plastic bag that contains their belongings. They often do not know where to turn to receive a meal, find shelter and to make a phone call. They also arrive emotionally and psychologically devastated, due to separation from their family members or the inability to work legally in the United States.

The Kino Border Initiative is responding to the critical humanitarian needs of migrants in many ways:

Aid Center for Migrants (CAM – Initials in Spanish)

The CAM provides two meals a day to migrant men, women and children deported to Nogales, Sonora, Mexico. The CAM also distributes clothing and personal care items, as well as providing orientation for social service assistance. It also offers some first aid assistance.

Nazareth House

Nazareth House is a shelter for migrant women and children, to respond to their vulnerability in the streets of Nogales, Sonora. It is a safe space where women and children can bathe, eat, sleep, call their families and reflect on their experience. They receive opportunities for prayer and pastoral support as well.

Presentations, Talks and Workshops

Offers presentations on the reality along the US-Mexico border and how the KBI and other faith groups are responding to the humanitarian crisis.

Immersion Experiences

Offers participants an opportunity to spend time with migrants and learn from their stories, as well as to understand the broader context of the border and immigration.

Retreat Day/Day of Reflection

Offers a day-long retreat to reflect on the issues surrounding immigration.

Kino Teens

Is a network of high school youth groups providing students the opportunity for direct service to deported migrants, for participation in educational activities offered to interested groups and organizations and for advocacy visits to local legislative offices.

Research

Migration is a complex phenomenon and for this reason, the Kino Border Initiative recognizes the importance of providing a space in which scholars and students can do research on migration and help find solutions to pressing policy issues. Past researchers have investigated topics such as service learning, nursing care for women

migrants and the effects of security policies on the U.S./Mexico border.

Advocacy

The KBI's advocacy efforts are rooted in Catholic teaching and are a response to the human realities that we encounter at the border. We partner with other organizations to advocate in the US and Mexico for policies that advance humane, just and workable migration in the region. KBI's advocacy is supported by a survey in its Aid Center for Migrants to obtain basic information about the people served and to document abuses committed against them as well as ongoing, in-depth documentation of migrants' experiences in Mexico and the U.S.

The **Holy Family Fund** is a program provided by Catholic Extension in partnership with local Catholic Charities offices. It provides emergency funds and services to a family after one or more of the undocumented income earning adults in the home are detained or deported by the US government. The families contribute to the fund on a monthly basis (\$20 for an individual, \$30 for a couple). The participant becomes eligible by enrolling through an agency such as Catholic Charities and paying their monthly fee to the Holy Family Fund. After the needs of the family are assessed, the family may receive benefits up to \$5000 per enrolled participant to help pay for rent or house payments, utilities, health care, etc. to maintain stability for the family. Much more information can be found in the brochures in the narthex.


We value your safety. Please take a moment to review this card.
