SOUGHT, SEEN AND SAVED

This Sunday, the readings invite us to see Jesus, but even more than that, to be seen by Jesus. In the gospel of Luke, Zacchaeus is described as rich, a chief tax collector, yet one who is an outcast among his own people. He has no social standing in society whatsoever because of his relationship with the Roman empire. In the eyes of the crowd, Zacchaeus has turned his back on his own people; he is a sinner. In his own eyes, Zacchaeus feels small in stature, but also lost, lonely and rejected. However, in the eyes of Jesus, Zacchaeus is a Son of Abraham. Zacchaeus is sought, seen and saved by his relationship with Jesus. The lost one has now been found.

Zacchaeus refuses to be lost in the crowd. He refuses to remain hidden. He refuses to run away from whom God is now calling him to be. Instead, he runs ahead of the crowd and climbs a sycamore tree. Everyone could see what he was doing. The gospel of Luke explains that he did that so he could see Jesus.

But here's what I wonder: what if he climbed that tree because he wanted to be seen by Jesus? What if that was how he faced the truth and reality of his own life? What if he wasn't just climbing a tree but was climbing the cross of being lost, lonely and rejected? What if Zacchaeus was offering all that he was and all that he had to Jesus? What if that was him crying out, "Here I am. This is my broken life. Look at me. Claim and recognize me, too, as a Son of Abraham!" That's exactly what Jesus did. He stopped and "looked up" at Zacchaeus. I can't help but wonder if that might not have been the first time anyone had ever really looked up to Zacchaeus. Jesus looked up to him with love and acceptance. Jesus looked up and invited himself into Zacchaeus' home and into his life. He saw more than a chief tax collector, a rich man, and a man short in stature. He saw what Zacchaeus couldn't see for himself. He saw one of his own. That's what Zacchaeus learns in today's gospel. We all want to know that Jesus sees more in us than we see in ourselves. We want to be recognized and called by name by the God who created us. We want to know that despite whatever may have become of our life, we, too, are a child of Abraham.

We want Jesus to call us out of our own tree and into a new life. I think that's what we all want. It's

what Zacchaeus wanted. If that is true, then today is our lucky day, because that's the promise the gospel holds for each one of us. Whatever it is that has made us short in stature and runs us up a tree, that's the place where Jesus stops, looks up with love and acceptance, and calls us back down into a new life. Let's not turn away from that place. Let's not turn away from the face of Christ. Zacchaeus's name really means "pure," "clean" and "innocent." That's his greater truth. That's what Jesus saw in Zacchaeus. It's what he sees in you and me, even when we don't see it in ourselves or each other. He looks up and calls us back to our truest selves. "Zacchaeus," Jesus says to us, "you come down here right now. That's not who you are. That's not your place. You come down and walk with me."

O Lord, help me to lose my fear of stepping outside my place, of doing things differently, of seeking Christ in my life. Christ's invitation awaits me to start anew, to make amends, to live in Christ's way. God of change and renewal, I give thanks for your love that makes this possible for me, and each one of us. In Jesus' name Amen.

What is your Zacchaeus story? When have you felt like Zacchaeus? How have you experienced being short in stature? It happens in all sort of ways. Has life ever cut you down to size by another person or life circumstance? Have you ever felt small and insignificant, ignored and of little importance? Have you ever felt as if you just don't measure up, that you're not enough? Do you sometimes feel as if you're always on the outside, never an insider? Does it seem as if you can't outgrow your past or the opinions of others? Are you constantly trying to prove yourself, not just to others, but to yourself, or even to God? Does it seem as if your life is not growing, maturing, or deepening, and that your growth has become stunted? Do you ever wonder if Jesus even notices you, knows who you are, knows your name? Have you ever felt powerless and overwhelmed by the circumstances of your life? Does it sometimes seem as if your value, worth and dignity have been defined by your past actions and choices, what you have done and left undone? Have you ever experienced being lost and anonymous in the crowds of life? Have you ever felt as if you just weren't up to what life was asking of you?

The Liturgical Arts Community...

creates a vibrant prayer and worship experience so that all may participate in a fully conscious and active way in the liturgy. This includes different forms of prayer and worship experiences, for all attending Holy Family. By virtue of our Baptism, all of us are called to continue our spiritual formation in Christ. This calling is a work in progress, a privilege offered to everyone who has made the decision to be a disciple of the Risen Jesus. For this reason, the Church offers special opportunities for the People of God to reaffirm their calling in Christ, and to encourage those who are preparing for initiation into our faith community.

Last weekend, Oct. 26/27, and this weekend, Nov. 2/3, we are celebrating Rite of Welcoming Weekends at Holy Family. On these weekends we recognize and celebrate three different groups of people who are seeking initiation: catechumens who are seeking Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist, candidates who are seeking entrance into our Roman Catholic tradition, and baptized Catholics who seek to complete their sacraments of initiation.

At the 9:00am Mass on Oct. 27, we celebrated this ancient ritual with those adults preparing to receive the initiation sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and/or Eucharist by participating in the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). The adults to be baptized will now be known as catechumens, while those previously baptized as Catholics or another Christian tradition, and now preparing to complete their initiation, will be known as candidates. At the 5:00 Masses on both Oct. 26 and Nov. 2, we celebrate this Rite with our young people preparing to receive the sacrament of First Eucharist. At the 4:00pm Mass on Oct. 26 we celebrated the Rite of Welcoming with our teens preparing to receive the sacrament of Confirmation. Already one with us by virtue of their infant Baptism, all of these young people will continue on their Order of Christian Initiation journey toward reception of those remaining initiation sacraments and full membership in the Church, the Body of Christ.

In this Rite all these candidates for initiation, assembled publicly for the first time, declare their intentions to us, the Church, by making promises to listen, pray and serve. We, in turn, accept and welcome them by our commitment to teach, support, care and pray for them on their continuing journey of conversion. In essence, for the young people, this ritual is a repeating of the beginning of the Rite of Infant Baptism. Now, instead of their parents speaking for them, they speak for themselves and are marked with the sign of the cross of Christ to strengthen them for the journey ahead.

In this Rite the entire community also witnesses to our commitment to continue living and growing in Christ. This decision includes a personal dedication to life-long spiritual growth and faith formation expressed in learning, prayer, worship, service and mentoring of others. Our own participation in the sacraments of initiation binds us to this ongoing journey of deepening faith and love. For the committed disciple of Christ, this journey is not an option.

Please welcome our youth and adult candidates for full initiation to this phase of their journey with your joyful encouragement. Teach them by your example and pray for them on their journey of faith with us all.







The Family & Teen Faith Community... offers faith formation and catechesis to preschool through elementary school aged children and high school teens and their families.

This past week, Dr. Peg did a presentation on the Mass for all the children making their First Communion this spring. Here are some of the highlights.

As the children came into the room Dr. Peg handed certain children items to take to their desks (a corporal, small glass bowl filled with unconsecrated hosts, a glass Chalice, a patent holding the large Priest's host, a ciborium, candles, purificators, a cruet filled with water, a cruet filled with wine).



As Catholics, we have many ways to pray.

- **Private prayer** is the name we give to those times when we talk to God by ourselves. Children shared examples of their own private prayer.
- Shared prayer is the name we give to those times when we pray with others, like saying grace with our family before dinner or praying with each other in class.
- **Liturgical prayer or Liturgy** is the name we give to those times we pray with our parish family. The Mass is an example of liturgical prayer.

Liturgical prayer follows certain patterns much like the rules of a game. This allows many people to participate at the same time in an organized way. Having the rules helps people know what to do or say so they can join in.

When we participate in Liturgical prayer, we sing or speak certain words and we use special actions we call **ritual gestures**, physical actions that express our faith.

Dr. Peg then had the children identify some of the ritual gestures they used. The children identified making the sign of the cross, bowing, folding their hands, exchanging the sign of peace.

The Mass has five main parts

1	2	3	4	5

Dr. Peg and the children then identified prayers and ritual gestures that were part of the first two parts of the Mass.

The rest of the time was spent on the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Dr. Peg compared this part of the Mass to Thanksgiving Dinner – since Eucharist means Thanksgiving. Using the metaphor of setting the table Dr. Peg had the individual students one by one place the items they were holding on a table, starting with the corporal (tablecloth), the candles, the sacred vessels (dishes), the food and the purificators (the napkins). Student volunteers then gave each child an unconsecrated host to taste.

At the end of the session each <u>class</u> was given their own child friendly Mass kit to use in their preparation in the classroom. Dr. Peg gave the catechists a packet with various ideas on how to use the Mass kit as a teaching tool. Dr. Peg sent parents their own PPT presentation on the Mass.

Things we did at the Festival to learn about Saints

- Each dass researched a saint and created a sign about their saint to carry during the festival. We then shared what we learned about our saint with others at the Festival and they shared what they learned about their saint with us.
- > We ran an obstade course set up in the Multitorium. Each dass participated as a team earning points for each obstade they completed. Doing so helped us learn
 - That we <u>dl</u> face obstades and challenges as we follow the way of Jesus
 - Saints were not perfect. They faced obstacles too. They teach us not to get discouraged because God doesn't care how many mistakes we make or how many times we fail as long as we keep trying
 - Being part of the Christ's Church our faith family means we are called to help and support each other along the way.
- > We did art projects to help us to remember that
 - Saints put God first and
 - Saints use the gifts and td ents God gave them to serve others

Perspective is everything

As we enter the final weeks of the Church Year, we focus our attention on what the Church refers to as the *last things*. This is a time for *keeping our eyes on the prize*, savoring the glorious inheritance that is ours, as children of God. Today's first reading assures us *our God can do all things*, and the psalmist sings of our Lord *who lifts up all who are falling and raises up all who are bowed down*. Soon we will see Christ our King, who triumphs over death, vanquishes evil and draws all the faithful into the fullness of divine love.



"What the caterpillar calls the end of the world the Master calls a butterfly."

Keeping the end in mind changes our perception of the present, so we are able to put



things in perspective. New perspectives reorient us. We gain clarity on what we value. Possibilities emerge. Often, everyday worries and concerns fall away, reducing the levels of stress and anxiety in our lives. Setting time aside to think and pray allows us to update the maps in our internal GPS system and reset our course if necessary.

New perspectives reorient us.

In every age, the followers of Jesus face obstacles and challenges that obscure the message of the gospel and distract us from becoming the person we are

meant to be. This is why we begin this period of reflection celebrating the saints and remembering family and friends who have gone before us *marked with the sign of faith*. Their lives provide us with concrete examples of how to follow Christ and find ways to face and meet the challenges of

gospel <u>living</u>. We share our belief in the *Communion of Saints*, that great cloud of witnesses who accompany us on our journey, as a source of hope and encouragement.

One of the most difficult challenges contemporary seekers and believers face in their quest for wholeness, has been coined the **busyness trap.** The cartoonist <u>Tim Kreider</u>, thinks busyness is one way we protect ourselves against that gnawing feeling that who we are and what we do is inconsequential. The very real persuasive pull of constant activity, so characteristic of modern life, is based on the belief that *we have to do more in order to be more*. Exacerbated by unrealistic social pressure and the fear that

As God's children we are more than enough and through God's grace becoming more, as we move from glory to glory (2 Cor. 3:18). I'd say that indeed is good news worth mulling over.




