We have some thought-provoking messages from Matthew's Jesus this weekend concerning rules, regulations and religious details, all of which our Jewish brothers and sisters refer to as the Law.

Christian religions are also filled with details that give our faith practice structure. Very often as religious institutions grow, so do the details of their practice. Jesus makes a statement that seems to always put the Law, and consequently other religious practices, into perspective. We hear him say in Matthews Gospel this week that he has not come to "...abolish the Law, but to fulfill it." Jesus was very faithful in his practice of Judaism. He learned that from Mary and Joseph. He was always respectful of a law that gave his spiritual journey structure. As he grew, and particularly in his public ministry, he was perceived as breaking that law often. His comments this week give depth to the law by encouraging reflection on and attention to things that lead up to a stated law. For example, he strongly suggests that not committing murder can be addressed by attending to unhealthy habits and uncontrolled emotions.

He seems to strongly suggest that self-reflection and self-examination for the original hearers, and for us, can get us closer to embracing his fulfillment of the LAW.

### Edwina Gateley

Born in Lancaster, England, Edwina Gatelev's educational experiences have awarded her a Teacher's Degree from her home country, a Master's Degree in Theology from Catholic Theological Union, Chicago, and certification as an HIV counselor in Illinois. After some time in praver and solitude and then spending a year on the streets of Chicago walking with the homeless and women involved in prostitution, Edwina founded Genesis House, a house of hospitality and nurturing for the women involved in prostitution. She also founded the Volunteer Missionary Movement (VMM) in England to recruit, prepare and send lay missionaries to work in the developing world. The VMM has sent over 3,000 women and men to serve in 26 countries throughout the world. Edwina's missionary work took her to Uganda where she established a school for Ugandan girls, which became the largest and most successful in the area. Edwina is a writer and speaker, leading national and international retreats as well as Parish Missions, and she continues to work with women in recovery through her small Foundation, Sophia's Circle.




Catechumen Jennifer Reyes

## Family & Teen Faith



**Preparing to receive** the sacrament of Confirmation at Holy Family, is a <u>two-year</u> process offered to high school teens. Rooted in a small faith-sharing group model, the teens gather on Sunday nights, to build community, reflect on their faith and pray with each other. In addition to the Sunday evening gatherings, the teens commit to doing community service together and attend two overnight retreats – one each year of the

#### program.

Our **FLAME** retreats are designed to bolster the individual's *experience* and *knowledge* of their own Catholic spirituality. Using a combination of large and small group settings, and an array of faith formation activities, the participants step away from the normal daily routine in the pursuit of spiritual "clarity."

A retreat is, truly, a unique experience for anyone that is privileged enough to experience one. Our teens consistently rank the retreats as a highlight of the preparation process. On January 25, our **Flame II** Confirmation candidates met for their final retreat. At the end of the retreat, one of the participant journals was left behind. The journal owner remains a mystery (no name was found on the journal). Looking for a name, I found this entry.

"I'm not really sure what I want from this retreat. I guess I want it to be lasting. The issue is during retreats you feel all spiritual and stuff and after you may still feel a little spiritual. But once school starts and other issues come up, you quickly forget. You quickly lose the sense of clarity and you stop thinking about your faith. I just want to get something... anything really. I just want something to stick with me."

This person is not alone! Many of us have gone through something like this – we can be massively impacted by a genuine spiritual experience and then the next week feel we are back to a sort of spiritual square one. We call this experience "The Retreat Effect"

Retreats are extremely useful; they are used to learn and reflect on specific issues, but they can

also act as a "*pipeline of Grace*" in which no provocation other than silence and prayer is utilized. The best retreats harness the power of both of these elements – there is time to learn and share and time to pause and let God speak what truth he will.

I, personally, have gone through what the writer describes... and I still do! Here's the thing, our life shouldn't be just a string of one-off spiritual experiences; we should welcome the *grace-filled constancy* that our Lord freely offers us. How can we do this? *Every day* we



can have a retreat-experience! Here are some ways I have found to mitigate the 'retreat effect'. Perhaps they may work for you too.

#### Retreat are intentional experiences. Be intentional.

In today's society, we are too busy *not* to set aside time for prayer. Every day, try to block off at least 15 minutes to talk and listen for God. God can offer us his peace, grace and clarity no matter what the time of day.

- In the morning ask yourself, where do I want to feel God's presence this day where do I need God's support?
- Taking the time to read some spiritual writings would be a smart way to hear God speak to you. In your reading, focus on what is relevant to your situation? Maybe God is trying to say something.
- At night (while we are winding down to begin with), being able to reflect on the day in prayer and meditation is also another way to break up the day's flow and allow God to enter in.

Letting God enter our consciousness regularly can help us maintain that "clarity" that we long for and the divine insight we so desperately need.

## **Parish Lenten Social Justice Project 2020**

The number 7 is highly significant in the bible as God rested on the 7th day of creation. Holy Family has completed six Lenten Social Justice Projects since the first visit to St. Paul in Kentucky in 2014. This is our 7th year and we plan to "rest" by focusing on a change in perspective. **We will reaffirm our commitment to the 7 major principles of Catholic social teaching** and review and receive current updates on our past six Lenten projects. Through the Lenten disciplines of prayer, fasting and almsgiving, let us be energized and recommit ourselves to share time, talent and treasure within our community of faith and beyond.

### The 7 major principles of Catholic social teaching are:

### Life and Dignity of the Human Person

The Catholic Church proclaims that human life is sacred and that the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. Our belief in the sanctity of human life and the inherent dignity of the human person is the foundation of all the principles of our social teaching. We believe that every person is precious, that people are more important than things, and that the measure of every institution is whether it threatens or enhances the life and dignity of the human person.

### **Call to Family, Community, and Participation**

The person is not only sacred but also social. How we organize our society in economics and politics, in law and policy directly affects human dignity and the capacity of individuals to grow in community. The family is the central social institution that must be supported and strengthened, not undermined. We believe people have a right and a duty to participate in society, seeking together the common good and wellbeing of all, especially the poor and vulnerable.

### **Rights and Responsibilities**

The Catholic tradition teaches that human dignity can be protected and a healthy community can be achieved only if human rights are protected and responsibilities are met. Therefore, every person has a fundamental right to life and a right to those things required for human decency. Corresponding to these rights are duties and responsibilities to one another, to our families, and to the larger society.

### **Option for the Poor and Vulnerable**

A basic moral test is how our most vulnerable members are faring. We are called to look at public policy decisions in an effort to achieve the common good, giving special attention to those with special needs and to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first.

### The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers

The economy must serve people, not the other way around. Work is more than a way to make a living; it is a form of continuing participation in God's creation. If the dignity of work is to be protected, then the basic rights of workers must be respected the right to productive work, to decent and fair wages, to organize and join unions, to private property, and to economic initiative.

### Solidarity

We are our brothers' and sisters' keepers, wherever they live. We are one human family, whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. Learning to practice the virtue of solidarity, learning that "loving our neighbor" has global dimensions in an interdependent world.

### **Care for God's Creation**

We show our respect for the Creator by our stewardship of creation. Care for the earth is not just an Earth Day slogan, it is a requirement of our faith. We are called to protect people and the planet, living our faith in relationship with all of God's creation. This environmental challenge has fundamental moral and ethical dimensions that cannot be ignored.
