### **Prayer-Infused Confidence, Compassion, and Selflessness**

Today's news is dominated by one thing: the rise and spread of the (COVID-19) novel coronavirus. It's easy to be gripped by fear. The coronavirus has created a panic shopping frenzy causing people to stock up on products ranging from cleansing wipes to peanut butter. We have heard of those who have had to wait hours for just two cases of bottled water, paper towels and toilet tissue. Suddenly, the crowds, the empty shelves, the rationing is making us all very nervous. One person expressed it this way, "Before it was a scare, now it's real." We also heard this week of the greedy bros who bought almost 18,000 bottles of hand sanitizer to make a profit off the fears of the general public. Whenever we love ourselves more than our neighbor, we are seeing with eyes closed, blind to the value of the other's life. When we can recognize the injustice of a situation, we are then feeling another's pain as our own, we see the needs and life of another as valuable and as important as our own. As we all prepare to hunker down in the midst of this growing pandemic, let us be reminded that panic, worry, fear, and greed accomplish nothing except weakness of our heart and head. It's been said that 90 percent of the things we worry or become panicked about never happen, and the other 10 percent are outside our control. It takes the same amount of energy to worry as it does to pray and be hopeful. One leads to peace, the other to panic. Faith teaches us to act wisely.

As Catholics and Christians, what does it mean to be "church" in times like this when our present circumstances keep us from physically gathering together, probably for the next coming weeks and maybe months? What do you want your reaction to this crisis to be? In the midst of this global crisis, how can we, as parishioners and faith leaders of Holy Family Parish, make a difference in our community and world?

This weekend's gospel of John tells us that the **man born blind** had his **eyes opened**, with the implication that they had been closed. This is not just about physical sight. This is about **spiritual seeing**. **Do we see with eyes opened or do we see with eyes closed? When we live and see with eyes closed, we withhold love, mercy, live in fear and let selfishness control or lives.** Often, we can feel so **small, helpless, and insignificant** in a crisis. But our **faith** tells us that there is always something we can do.

Jesus takes on our suffering, bears it, and moves through it to resurrection. This is "the paschal mystery" we are moving towards. We too can follow this path, actively joining God's loving solidarity with all who are suffering since the foundation of the world. Jesus does not ask us to worship him. He asks us to follow him by trusting and allowing this risky but revealing journey. If God is indeed **Infinite Love**, then humans and all of creation are **Infinite Becoming** (which is the core meaning of "divinization" or *theosis*, the process of salvation). Let us call out to our Father in heaven. We know a God who walks with crucified people, and thus, reveals and "redeems" their plight as God's own. For them, God is not observing human suffering from a distance, He is somehow *in* human suffering *with us and for us*.

In times of crisis, the world needs steady people who are strengthened by God's grace and made selfless by God's power. When we offer peace, forgive, act with compassion, we are seeing with eyes open. Our eyes open when we look beyond outward appearances and see as God sees by looking into the heart of the other person or situation. With open eyes, Jesus sees in us more beauty, more goodness, more holiness, than we often see in ourselves and each other. His love is intended to open our eyes to see anew; a new life, a new world, and new possibilities. What we often don't understand is that his love is in our midst and for our good, even when it doesn't feel that way. Jesus is a prophet who has come into this world for our love and healing. When we see with open eyes, we see beauty, hope, and goodness. We must then act wisely and responsibly.

Let us show **prudent and compassionate care** for those who are more susceptible to illness (including the elderly and immune-deficient) while modeling the **strength and hope**, characteristic of those who **know Christ**. Let us recognize that there is some subjectivity in responding to a crisis, even among those **listening** to and seeking God's wisdom. Pray for the authorities running our countries and cities. Pray for the medical teams treating the sick. Pray for those who have been infected, for the people afraid to leave their homes, for those living in red zones, for those at high risk with other illnesses, and for the elderly. Pray that the Lord would protect us all and keep us in His tender care.

Where does Jesus' love intersect in your life? What is it asking of us?

Where does our seeing diverge from Jesus' seeing?

What possibilities and hope does Jesus' love offer you and our world right now?

Born in Lancaster, England, Edwina Gateley's educational experiences have awarded her a Teacher's Degree from her home country, a Master's Degree in Theology from Catholic Theological Union, Chicago, and certification as an HIV counselor in Illinois. *After some time in prayer and* solitude and then spending a year on the streets of Chicago walking with the homeless and women involved in prostitution, Edwina founded Genesis *House, a house of hospitality* and nurturing for the women involved in prostitution. She also founded the Volunteer Missionary Movement (VMM) in England to recruit, prepare and send lay missionaries to work in the developing world. The VMM has sent over 3,000 women and men to serve in 26 countries throughout the world. Edwina's missionary work took her to Uganda where she established a school for Ugandan girls, which became the largest and most successful in the area. Edwina is a writer and speaker, leading national and international retreats as well as Parish Missions, and she continues to work with women in recovery through her small Foundation, Sophia's Circle.

We run three fundraisers prior to the trip to defray the cost per teen to between \$300-350 All teens wishing to defray their personal cost are asked to help with each fundraiser.

### LENT SOCIAL JUSTICE 2020 LOVE FIRST -A CHANGE IN PERSPECTIVE

#### The Human Concerns Community...

offers assistance with life's basic needs, spiritual and emotional support as well as additional resources with partners in our community while promoting mercy and justice by putting our faith into action. The number 7 is highly significant in the bible as God rested on the 7th day of creation. Holy Family has completed six Lenten Social Justice Projects since the first visit to St. Paul in Kentucky in 2014. This is our 7th year and we plan to "rest" by focusing on Love First. Because when **we Love First**, we experience **a Change in Perspective**. We will reaffirm our commitment to the 7 major principles of Catholic social teaching and review and receive current updates on the impact of our past six Lenten projects. Through the Lenten disciplines of prayer, fasting and alms-giving, let us be energized and recommit ourselves to share time, talent and treasure within our community of faith and beyond.

### What does Catholic social teaching say about the Call to Family, Community, and Participation?

#### **Call to Family, Community, and Participation**

The person is not only sacred but also social. How we organize our society—in economics and politics, in law and policy—directly affects human dignity and the capacity of individuals to grow in community. The family is the central social institution that must be supported and strengthened, not undermined. We believe people have a right and a duty to participate in society, seeking together the common good and well-being of all, especially the poor and vulnerable.

#### Lenten Social Justice Project 2019 Kino Border Initiative and the Holy Family Fund

Last year, Holy Family raised awareness of immigrants striving to live a life that is productive while in an environment that is safe and nurturing. Partnering with Catholic Extension Society, we raised, in total, **\$79,698** for KBI and The Holy Family Fund.

**The Kino Border Initiative (KBI)** promotes U.S./Mexico border and immigration policies that affirm the dignity of the human person and a spirit of bi-national solidarity through direct assistance and education. Every year, thousands of migrant men, women and children are deported to Nogales, Sonora, Mexico or arrive in the city fleeing from Central America. They often arrive with only the clothes on their backs and a small plastic bag that contains their belongings. They often do not know where to turn to receive a meal, find shelter and to make a phone call. They also arrive emotionally and psychologically devastated, due to separation from their family members or the inability to work legally in the United States.

#### Love First

KBI recently dedicated a brand new building to better serve people fleeing their homeland due to famine or violence. The dedication began with a **Love First** moment. A woman noticed people walking in her neighborhood with white lips. She knew that meant they were hungry and dehydrated. She saw so many people that she thought all she could do was pray. While continuing to see these people, she then wondered, "How much can it cost to offer them some beans and a cup of water?" That was in 2010. What began with a woman with love for her neighbor in her heart grew to what is now KBI. They began to serve people in a small building holding approximately 100 people at a time. Since 2010, it is estimated 775,000 immigrants have been served by KBI in that small building. This new building with greater capacity allows KBI to provide additional services such as counseling, sleeping quarters and a clothing room.

Because of our donation to fund support services to their visitors, KBI dedicated the Social Services Room in the new facility in Holy Family's honor.

**The Holy Family Fund** is a program provided by Catholic Extension in partnership with local Catholic Charities offices and other agencies providing case management. It provides emergency funds and services to a family after one or more of the undocumented income-earning adults in the home are detained or deported by the US government. The families contribute to the fund on a monthly basis (\$20 for an

individual, \$30 for a couple). The participant becomes eligible by enrolling through an agency such as Catholic Charities and paying their monthly fee to the Holy Family Fund. After the needs of the family are assessed, the family may receive benefits up to \$5000 per enrolled participant to help pay for rent or house payments, utilities, health care, etc. to maintain stability for the family.

#### Love First

In August, 2019, nearly 700 workers in chicken processing plants in the Jackson, MS diocese were arrested in ICE raids. Most were of Guatemalan descent. Beginning with **Love First**, Catholic Extension, with the assistance of Holy Family Parish, has been instrumental in providing resources and aid to local Catholic churches serving these families whose lives were turned upside down in a matter of moments. I had the privilege to be with a few of these families in November as they told stories of what transpired during the raids and how this experience is currently affecting them, their children and their community. Separating children from a parent has long-term psychological effects. To make matters more dire, the children are not allowed to speak about their experience or the experience of their parents in school. The trauma festers with no safe place to talk about fears and concerns. The Holy Family Fund is currently helping hundreds of people affected in the raids by providing clinical counselors to listen and provide practical steps toward healing. This **Love First** step is crucial for these families to begin rebuilding their lives.
