
Session 3 — The Eucharist is About Sharing — Part A Opening Prayer

In Jesus' name, we pray.



Parent Notes

Parents: let the kids wrestle with solving the riddle only giving guidance when needed.

This is a group project of the family has to arrive one answer.

Answer: Love

Parent talking points - put in your own words

- Everything God does is an expression of love. Point back to the things you have talked about to reinforce this point
 - God created in order to share his love and life
 - God gives us gifts, talents and abilities because he loves us
 - God gave us each other and our extended family and friends
 - God invited us to be his followers and members of his Body the Church, in Baptism, because he loves us.
 - In Baptism, we received the Holy Spirit to help and guide us, another expression of God's love for us.

• The Eucharist is an expression of love – another way God shares himself with us as an act of love.

Parent Talking Points – easy to relate back to video

- It is important that we remember God's love is
 - Unconditional (may have to explain what unconditional means)
 - Forever eternal it never ends
 - Extravagant, always over-the-top, more than we can even imagine
 - Given freely God does not wait for us to ask for love God loves first
 - Never forced on us God does not make us receive his love, he offers it and we can choose to take or not. Even when we refuse God's love, God never stops loving us. God looks for another opportunity to offer his love
 - Nothing we can say or do, think or feel, not say, not do can ever change the way God feels
 about us. It can however, change the way we feel about God and others and how others
 feel about us.

A Parable about Sharing

 - ➤ **Discussion** Feel free to use the following questions or create your own. There is a lot packed into this classic folk tale and closely parallels what Jesus taught.
 - 1. At the very beginning of the story, we are told that the monks had a question they wanted to answer. What was that question?

Answer: What makes us happy?

- 2. In the beginning of the story what made it difficult for the villagers to share?

 Answer: hard times, suspicion of others, fear of not having enough for themselves, afraid no one would be able to take of them and their families
- 3. What effect did not sharing have on the villagers?

Answer: They had little to do with each other – they lacked a connection

4. How did the villagers treat the monks when they arrived in the village?

Answer: They hid and ignored them

- 5. What did this tell the monks about the villagers?
 - **Answer:** They did not know happiness
- 6. What did the monks do to teach the villagers how to share?

Answer: They made stone soup

- 7. Who was the first person in the village to help the monks? (*the little girl*) Why do you think she helped them?
- 8. Why did the little girl's mother get interested in learning to make stone soup?

 Answer: Stones were plentiful and this would help her provide food for her family
- 9. What made the rest of the villagers get interested in the stone soup?
 Answer: Curiosity
- 10. Did the monks ever ask the villagers for ingredients? (No)
- 11. How did they get the villagers to add things to the soup?

Answer: They kept telling the villagers what would make the soup better, more delicious

12. What began happening to the villagers?

Answer: As each person opened the heart to give, the next person gave even more

- 13. When the soup was finally ready to eat how did the villagers decide to eat it? (Together)
- 14. What did they do after they ate the soup?

Answer: Told stories, sang songs and celebrated with each other

- 15. Why do you think they did this?
- 16. What did the villagers learn from this experience?

Answer: Sharing makes us all richer

17. What was the answer to the monks' original question, what makes us happy?

Answer: Being with others, sharing with others, celebrating with others.

Slide 8 - Making the connections with Eucharist

Why did Jesus give us the gift of the Eucharist?
Jesus wants us to be happy. He knew being with others, sharing with others, and celebrating with others would make us happy.
Jesus knows sharing makes us all richer, and the most important thing we can share is the gift of ourselves.
Jesus understands that sharing creates a chain reaction - as each person opens their heart to give, they inspire the next person to give even more.
By sharing the gift of himself with us, Jesus knew we would be more likely to share ourselves with others and soon the whole world would be sharing and becoming a better, happier place. Jesus called this the Kingdom of God .
Jesus knows that if we did not share with others we could never become one with Him and each other, the way Jesus is one with the Father and the Holy Spirit. Being in communion is what brings joy and fulfillment to our lives.
